GET COMPOSTING!

If you hate having to buy compost why not have a go at making your own? It's free and better for the environment. More than a third of household waste is made up of organic material which can be composted. Grass cuttings, unwanted plants, cardboard, newspapers, fruit and vegetable peelings are all ideal. Derbyshire County Council has a scheme which offers compost bins at very reasonable prices - with the added bonus that they can be delivered to households. Compost bins cost as little as £16.98, plus £5.49 delivery per order. They are supplied by Straight plc.

The low-cost compost bin is made from recycled plastic and carries a 15 year guarantee. The unit doesn't require any putting together.

You can find out more about how to start composting at the Derbyshire County Council website by going to www.derbyshire.gov.uk/composting There you'll find more information as well as a leaflet on achieving the perfect compost. Composting is a cost-effective and natural process that transforms kitchen and garden waste into a valuable resource. It helps to reduce the amount of organic waste sent to landfill, reducing greenhouse gases. Compost is a nutrient-rich food product for the garden which helps to improve soil structure, maintain moisture levels and keeps the soil's PH balance in check.

As well as garden waste, much of your food waste can be composted. A kitchen caddy allows anything from fruit and vegetable peelings to egg shells, tea bags, or even shredded paper to be collected and then emptied into your compost bin.

We are delighted that so many friends in Kniveton enjoy filling shoe boxes for children overseas. Last year we had about 200 boxes at the service in November, held in the village hall, which is where we are planning to hold the next service in November. We are continuing to fund-raise towards the cost of transport, as we feel it is important that we ensure these costs are covered.

First, we have decided to have a Table Top sale over the weekend of the August Bank Holiday, 22nd/23rd/24th August in Cornerstone café at Ashbourne Methodist Church. The stalls will be staffed from 11 am – 2 pm. We will be pleased to receive any items for sale, not specifically shoe box items, but bric a brac, cakes and second-hand books. If you are having a clear out please remember us. Any items we have left over will be taken to charity shops. This venture was very successful last year and we hope to raise money to help with transport. Last year we managed to fill over 100 extra boxes with items left over after the checking process, and of course these had to be paid for. The requested transport donation this year will be £3 per box.

We are also planning to have our usual coffee morning in Cornerstone in the autumn. The date for this will be announced nearer the time, but it will be around the middle of October. There will be lots of items which can go into boxes at very reasonable prices, and also, of course, pre-covered boxes.

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

At a meeting of Kniveton Parish Council on Tuesday 21st May 2013, the following items were discussed:-

Parish Field – Letter received from Kniveton School requesting extension of one storage shed and the erection of a further. As this would not impact on the site it was agreed to grant permission.

Flooding at the Hillocks – Some work has been carried out by DCC on the area outside Hillocks Cottage but work has ceased leaving a hole in the road with barriers and the curbs still to be raised. It also appears that a gully/drain was broken during work by Severn Trent's contractors during recent work and this needs remediating.

Caravans at Newhouse Farm – The DDDC Enforcement Officer has made a visit and action has been taken.

Standlow Lane – Reported that wide vehicles are causing damage to verges and a sign indicating the 8' width of the road has been removed by persons unknown. The police have been involved and investigations have taken place but to no avail. Whilst councillors appreciate the problem it was agreed that it was a highway issue and not a Parish Council issue.

Highways - Despite volunteers expressing an interest in *Speedwatch* training, it has been decided by Derbyshire Constabulary that the use of the Mobile Police Station is more effective in deterring speeding vehicles. It is also a safer option as is the case with many villages, it is unsafe for *would be speed watchers* to stand on the verge monitoring through traffic. Previously reported potholes on Main Road and Longrose Lane still awaiting action.

Footpaths - Planned clearance work on the footpath from James' Lane to Longrose Lane and the Jitty has been carried out. Reported that the direction post for the footpath leaving Longrose Lane in the direction of Longrose Farm has been removed and is in need of replacing.

Correspondence - The Clerk read out a letter from a resident concerning a dispute over overhanging vegetation. The resident asked that the Parish Council should place the letter in the Kniveton Newsletter but having sought advice, it was agreed that the issue was outside the remit of the Parish Council and as such, councillors were only prepared to insert the following observation in the Kniveton Newsletter. . *From time to time, overgrowth from boundary hedges and trees present a hazard to both pedestrians and other road users. Indeed, on occasions, the Parish Council has requested that individual residents carry out work on boundary hedges in the interests of health and safety. It should be noted however, that any resident would be ill-advised to carry out any cutting back to another resident's boundary without first contacting the householder concerned and gaining permission.*

Finance - Accounts for Financial Year ending 31.03.13 were accepted as a true record of the Parish Council's finances. The Annual Audit Return for financial year ending 31.03.13 also met with the Parish Council's agreement.

Friends to cherish and life to lead.


Dust if you must.
