UPDATE ON RESOLVING B5035 SPEEDING ISSUES

The Ashbourne Safer Neighbourhood police-led scheme has agreed to make the reduction of traffic speed in the outlying villages such as Kniveton a priority. This means that more resources will be put into regular speed enforcement with cameras. A Community Speedwatch scheme has been set up in the village and a first training session has taken place; any more volunteers to take part will be very welcome - contact Mary Vaughan (01335 343308) for details.

The advice of Irene Ratcliffe, our county councillor, is to implement as soon as possible the measures which have been agreed, and await the results of trials in other villages of other measures. These include the use of interactive speed indicator signs at Hulland Ward, and 20 mph speed restrictions at three other villages. The county council policies on the use of these measures might then change, and Kniveton might become eligible.

The re-surfacing of the road will take place soon. The white lines and cats' eyes will be replaced at the approaches to the village as they were before the recent work took place, but not on the stretch through the village. It is stressed that this is for a trial period only, and it is up to residents to report to the parish council on the effectiveness of this in reducing speed and accidents. It is appreciated that many residents do not want the lines and cats' eyes removed, but real specific evidence of the results of this trial is needed to see if they should be replaced. Please let any parish councillor know of any incidents which might be relevant.

The introduction of a 20 mph speed limit past the school will go ahead when the county council has let the contract for the work.

The extension of the yellow zigzags up to the school entrance on Longrose Lane and on the corner opposite the school will take place soon.

Measures to stop water flowing across the road above the Hillocks will be completed before the winter, and as the road surface can become slippery even without this water, temporary ice warning signs will be provided by the county council if necessary.

The installation of more effective rumble strips and speed countdown signs at both entrances to the village is still being discussed with the county council.

The parish council is deciding the details of the installation of larger, more welcoming signs at the village entrances to help to convey to motorists that they are passing through a village, not using a motorway, and must therefore slow down. Any help from residents with the design of these signs will be most welcome.

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting of Kniveton Parish Council took place on Tuesday 19th July 2016 and the following items were discussed:-

Parish Field – Cllr Bradbury reported that some hedge cutting was needed by residents with boundaries adjoining the field. Also reported, a broken footpath gate which needs replacing in the interests of safety. Cllr Bradbury to replace gate.

Standlow Lane – Residents are concerned about speeding in Standlow Lane; Cllr Ratcliffe to pursue. Concern also for activities at Newhouse Farm with intrusive noise late into the night, siting of caravans with no licence and a recent caravan fire. Cllr Rose to pursue with DDDC Environmental Officer.

Highways – See a separate report on ‘Measures to Improve Road Safety’ in Kniveton Village. With the recent weather, there has been a deal of overgrowth in hedges. Councillors are particularly concerned where boundary hedges narrow footways and pavements causing a safety issue and making it necessary for pedestrians to step into the road.

Kniveton residents with boundary hedges facing onto footways and pavements, please ensure that hanging vegetation is sufficiently cut back to enable pedestrians to pass safely without having to step onto the road. Likewise, car owners should not block access by parking on pavements and footways causing similar difficulties for pedestrians.

Footpaths – DCC has agreed to carry out some work on the pond at Washpool Lane, jetting and clearing gulleys and drains. Unfortunately at this stage, there are no funds available for resurfacing Washpool Lane.

Estate Agent ‘For Sale’ boards – Of late several boards have appeared on council land at the junction of 5035 and Longrose Lane adjacent the Village Hall. Clerk to contact agents requesting that boards are not erected at this location.

Finance - Payments and balances to 19th July 2016 were presented and approved by the meeting, proposed Cllr Rose, seconded Cllr Vaughan. a) Having received a grant, a laptop computer has been purchased for use by the clerk for parish council business. b) It was agreed that a maturing Leek United Bond, ring-fenced as a sinking fund for Playing Field renewal be reinvested in a three year bond. c) A BBQ and donations raised £735 for purchase of new village signage.

Planning

16/00368/FUL- Single story extension and porch at Brook Cottage, Pethills Lane for Mr Griffiths – no objections

16/00406/FUL – Erection of replacement garage with games room/store over at Bankside Cottage, Foxholes Lane for Mr & Mrs Tink – no objections

16/ 00460/FUL – Alteration and extension to public house and formation of 2 letting rooms at The Ketch for Hopton Property – no objections.

16/00471/FUL – Replacement rear extension and workshop at 5 Ostrich Cottages for Mr Frost – Parish Council objection on the grounds of machinery noise in a residential area (nb Cllr Bradbury and Cllr Rose registered an interest)

16/00485/FUL – Proposed touring caravan site with amenity block, waste disposal point and recycling area at The Ketch for Mr Leahy. A lengthy discussion took place on this application with contributions from residents. Councillors agreed to look into the application more thoroughly before making its response.

Comments – Proposed Cllr McConnachie, seconded by Cllr Rose that Parish Council sponsor two prizes for the ‘Scarecrow Competition’ £20 and £10 with all in agreement.

STILL GOING STRONG AFTER
80 YEARS



Kniveton WI is celebrating its 80 birthday

Members met at Willowbank for a garden party in celebration of their 80th birthday. A most enjoyable evening with good food, drink and a quiz based on characters who were around in 1936. The weather was ideal, what more could we ask for?

80 years ago there were eleven institutes within the Dovedale Group and now there are only four left with Kniveton being one of the four.

When Kniveton was first formed meetings were held in the clubroom at the side of the Old Angel Inn. This venue lasted until 1958 – 59 when the clubroom was converted into a house. The meetings then moved into the school, when the cost of hire proved expensive and they moved to the chapel schoolroom. When membership increased, they went back to the school and eventually ending up in the village hall in 1991 when the hall was built. We are still meeting there today every third Wednesday with 21 members. Long may it continue!

Past members remembered are Mrs Unwin and Mrs Bott, who were both presidents. Fond memories of other long serving members who are no longer with us are Mrs Rayworth, Mrs Johnson, Mrs Hunt, Mrs Chadfield, Miss Sargeant, Mrs Palmer, Mrs Brown, Mrs Naylor and of course our present members Nancy and Barbara's mother, Mrs Stafford. I would like to mention that Barbara and Nancy have been in Kniveton WI for a total of 124 years between them!! What an achievement!
