KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting of Kniveton Parish Council took place on Tuesday 17th May 2016 and the following items were discussed:-

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Reports were received from Cllr Rose (Kniveton CE Primary School and Kniveton Village Hall).

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL AGM

Election of Officers – Cllr McConnachie was elected as Chair and Cllr Barnett as Vice Chair.

Parish Field – Cllr Bradbury reported that the field has been cut twice and that some maintenance work has been carried out to remedy a drainage issue. Some dog fouling is still taking place despite the threat of hefty fines should the dog owner in question be reported.

Highways – See a separate report on 'Measures to Improve Road Safety' in Kniveton Village.

Footpaths – Reported, some attention needed to property boundary wall where stones have fallen onto the Jitty footpath. Clerk reported that Rights of Way Maintenance Grant for 2016/2017 remains £495 and stressed the importance of utilising the fund to undertake routine footpath work in the village.

Finance - Payments and balances to 17th May 2016 were presented and approved by the meeting. Likewise, the annual accounts were approved as was the annual audit submission.

It was agreed that section 137 grants would be made to the Kniveton Newsletter (£200), the Get Together Club (£300) and Churchyard mowing (£500).

Planning – Cllr Rose drew attention to Derbyshire Dales Local Plan and the implications for the provision of new housing in the Derbyshire Dales area.

Defibrillators – A new round of grants is now available for application

which this time will require some funding from those applying. There remains some doubt as to whether the ribbon nature of the village would considerably reduce the effectiveness of siting a defibrillator at the Village Hall. Further investigation requested.

Chapel News – memories and celebrations.

The Methodist Chapel had two special events in May, both of which were at the main church in Ashbourne. On 9th May we came together with friends from the chapel and the village to remember and give thanks for the life of Joe Stubbs, husband to Enid, nee Bott, and brother-in-law of David (Bott) from Brook Farm. The church was packed, with standing room only, such was the esteem in which Joe was held. The singing of rousing hymns raised the roof, and projected photos of Joe, Enid and their family were a delight to see, and brought many memories. Until his stroke Joe had a beautiful tenor voice, and it was a great sadness to him, and others, that he was no longer able to sing the praises of the Lord, and preaching was also denied him. He will be long remembered in many circles. After the service we had opportunity to share further memories over tea and cakes.

Our second celebration took place on 11th May, again at Ashbourne Methodist Church. This time we joined with friends from the Circuit, as well as friends from the village, to acknowledge a special anniversary. It is 60 years since Sister Merle Wilde was accredited as a Local Preacher (Lay Reader), a great achievement. Merle first 'heard the call' at an Anniversary Service in Kniveton Chapel, later accepting a further call to offer for the Diaconate, and then missionary service in Africa. Once again, the church was full, and Merle was presented with a framed certificate to mark the occasion. We congratulate Merle, and thank her for all she does, not only for the Chapel, but also in the Kniveton community, where she is well known and much loved. Although now in her 90's Merle continues to take services around the Circuit and undertakes pastoral visits. After the service we had the pleasure of sharing lunch in the church hall. As mentioned in the last Newsletter we celebrate the Chapel Anniversary on 27th July, when we will be dedicating a new Communion table for the chapel. The table will be dedicated to the memory of one of our late village members, Mrs Phyllis Rayworth, whom many of you will remember. In her later years Phyllis was unable to get to the chapel but we still kept close contact with her, sometimes meeting in her cottage. We hope to have Phyllis's family with us on this occasion. You will perhaps remember that I said in the previous report that the table is being made by James Howe, who had links with Kniveton. We hope that James will also be able to join us on the 27th July. We would be delighted to see friends from the village on this special Sunday.

1	Installing interactive speed indicator signs at both entrances to the village (as at Hulland Ward).	Kniveton does not meet DCC's requirements
2	Introducing a 20 mph school safety zone.	Works being costed - no commitment yet to carry out
3	Renewing/installing rumble strips at both en- trances to the village, increasing in closeness and intensity, and installing larger signs counting down to the 30mph limit (as at Brailsford).	Rumble strips: will be done - suggested not within 200m of a residential property Signs: no comments re- ceived

9	Consider the possibility of reducing the speed from 50 to 40 to 30 instead of directly from 50 to 30.	Not of any significant value - bends already slow down traffic

Parish council to take lead:

Installing larger, more welcoming signs and gateways at the village entrances; it is understood that authority for this would be granted by the county council.

Setting up Speed Watch, with residents working with Police Community Support Officers using radar guns to detect motorists travelling at over 35 mph; several residents volunteered to help with this.

Discussing with the tenants the enhancement of the area in front of the Red Lion.

Please note that the residents did not want the removal of the broken white line and cats' eyes on the straight section of road through the village, as had been suggested.

We will be discussing the officer's responses with our county councillor Irene Ratcliffe, to see if we can make any progress with the measures which the officer does not support.
