

CHARLOTTE'S CARROT CUPCAKE RECIPE

Carrot cupcakes - a lower calorie, lower fat, higher protein & delicious version

So Christmas has been and gone, the chocolate stash is dwindling but the shops are already stocking Easter eggs, so it'll soon be restocked! January usually sees a change of diets as many people opt for healthier versions of their favourites. One of my top choices is carrot cake, not the typical coffee shop type, that's almost as big as the plate and can hit you with as much as 600cal per serving, but this recipe, which I've adapted over time

Ingredients - makes 16-20 depending on which cases you use 125g sugar 250g quark 25g oil (I use odourless coconut oil, you'll need it warmish so it's liquid, but sunflower oil originally) 100g of apple purée (either homemade or a shortcut is to use a pouch of apple baby food!)` 3 medium eggs

Dry:

250g self raising flour

(I use a gluten-free variety which works well in this recipe with + 1 tsp of xanthum gum which is a baking aid in gluten free baking, available from Natural Choice & M&S)

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp cinnamon

1 pinch salt

zest of 1 unwaxed lemon

zest of 1 washed orange

Fruit & nuts: 3 medium sized carrots thinly grated 1 apple grated 75g raisins 75g walnuts crushed/processed Icing ingredients if using (see bottom of page)

Pre heat oven to 170fan & use a mixer or a hand held whisk, you'll also need two x 12 muffin tins

1 start by crushing the walnuts, grating the apple and finely grating the carrots

2 mix the sugar, oil and quark together

3 add eggs and mix in

4 in a separate bowl mix all the dry ingredients together and then add this to the first bowl & mix together (or if you'd like to save on washing up, add the flour on top, then place bicarb, baking soda, cinnamon, salt & zests on top of the flour & using a spoon, gently mix these into just the flour level first, then whisk it all together)

5 finally, mix in the carrot, apple, raisins, walnuts

6 if using paper cupcake cases, spray them with a cake release spray or brush with a little fat. I like baking cups which are grease proof coated so non-stick

7 check after 15 minutes, cupcakes should have risen well & taken on a warm brown colour, but not too dark. All ovens vary they may need up to 10 minutes more, dip a toothpick into the centre of one and it should come out clean if the centre is cooked through.

Leave to cool, eat un-iced (can be frozen un-iced) or choose one of the following icings

200g cream cheese, 100g very soft butter, 125g icing sugar, 2 TBSP lemon juice (my choice!)

250g quark, 3 sachets (33g) low cal white hot choc powder

Nutritional info: 1 un-iced serving 187cals, Fat 5.3g, Carbs 29.1g, Protein 5.3g

UPDATE ON RESOLVING THE B5035 SPEEDING ISSUES

- <u>Absence of white lines and cats' eyes</u>: there have been mixed reports: there were problems with the road "disappearing" when entering the village from the Hognaston direction in the fog, and two articulated lorries travelling in opposite directions had great difficulty passing each other when both were too far into the middle of the road. However, some people have said that they have felt the need to drive more slowly, and the fact that lorries are driven further away from the pavement makes walking though the village more pleasant. When all the appropriate measures have been put in place and there has been time for their effectiveness in reducing speed to be assessed, the situation with the lines and cats' eyes will be reviewed, so do keep your comments coming in to any parish councillor.
- <u>20mph school safety zone</u>: the county council has been unable to say when the work will be carried out, but we hope that it will be soon.
- <u>Rumble strips</u>: we are still discussing with the county council the need for these to be more obvious.

Village signs: work on the design and installation of these is progressing.

<u>Community Speed Watch</u>: more sessions are scheduled to take place.

<u>Flooding of the road above the Hillocks</u>: the mitigation works have been carried out by the county council, and we wait to see their effectiveness. Do report any concerns or problems to the county or parish councils.

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting of Kniveton Parish Council took place on Tuesday 24th January 2017 and the following items were discussed:-

Digital Derbyshire – Representatives from the Digital Derbyshire project addressed the meeting. See separate article.

Parish Field – The refixing of the goal posts still outstanding.

Defibrillator – External cabinet for defibrillator to be mounted on Village Hall outer wall. Familiarity training for residents in using a defibrillator to be organised at the next meeting.

Vacancy – Interviews for Parish Clerk position to takes place early February.

Highways – See separate report on B5035. Reported that an overgrown hedge on the main road at Stoneycroft Manor continues to present a hazard.

Discussion and decision made on suitable signage for entrance/exit from village. Cost to be met from DCC grant, recent local fund raising event and parish council funds.

Footpaths – Reported that the bridleway at the top of Madge Hill by the sheep pens is in need of some resurfacing. Proposed that the parish council provides the materials for the farmer to make good the surface.

Finance – Payments and balances to 24th January 2017 were presented and approved by the meeting, proposed Cllr Howe, seconded Cllr Vaughan Resolved that there should be no increase in the Annual Precept for 2017-2018 remaining at current level of £4295.00.

<u>16/00912/LBALT</u> – internal and external alterations for Mr & Mrs S Griffiths at Brook Cottage, Pethills Lane, Kniveton. *The Parish Council raised no objections to this applica-tion.*

<u>16/00880/FUL</u> – Conversion of outbuilding to single dwelling house for Mr & Mrs Bennett at Ladycroft Farm, Main Street, Kniveton. *No objections raised by Parish Council to this application.*

<u>16/00840/FUL</u> – Erection of detached annex, single storey extensions for Mr A Staniforth at Croft Dene, Main Street, Kniveton. *No objections raised by Parish Council to this application.*

The following two planning applications prompted a deal of discussion with representations made by residents objecting to the proposals.

<u>16/00929/FUL</u> – Use of land as a touring caravan site with amenity block, waste disposal point and recycling area for Mr Leahy at Camp Site, The Ketch, Ashbourne Road, Kniveton

<u>16/00930/FUL</u> - Erection of 9 holiday chalets, alterations to Kings Head Lane access, parking and landscaping for Mr Leahy at the Campsite, The Ketch, Ashbourne Road, Kniveton

Councillors were unable to support these planning applications on the grounds of a) Visual effects on the area b) highway safety issues c) effects on existing buildings and d) nature conservation issues.

DIGITAL DERBYSHIRE AND OUR BROADBAND SPEEDS

Representatives from Digital Derbyshire attended the recent parish council meeting to provide an update on the roll out of fibre broadband. They highlighted that Kniveton was initially identified as being part of the commercial roll out of fibre, therefore under EU and UK rules it was removed from the first phase of the Digital Derbyshire programme. The village is fed from Ashbourne cabinet 4, which was upgraded as part of BT's programme, but the cabinet is situated 2.7 miles away, so residents don't benefit from an uplift in speeds.

On a positive note, Kniveton is included in Digital Derbyshire's second phase of work which lasts until the end of 2018. The initial planning for the structure is currently underway, and Digital Derbyshire will keep the parish council informed with developments. One point is that the village is not due to be fibre enabled until the summer of 2018.

As an interim solution, central government has committed to giving a broadband service with at least 2Mbps download speed to every premise in the UK. This is via a voucher scheme which residents can redeem (up to £350) with independent suppliers of either wireless or satellite. The voucher covers hardware, installation, commissioning and activation – not the ongoing monthly costs. Residents can find out more on the Digital Derbyshire website, under the Better Broadband Subsidy Scheme: <u>www.digitalderbyshire.org.uk</u> BT has a community fibre partnership programme which is included in the Better Broadband Subsidy Scheme outlined above. This is where the community can contribute towards a fibre structure being installed in the village. BT does make a financial contribution to the cost of the installation of fibre, especially if a primary school cannot obtain download speeds of 2Mbps. Digital Derbyshire did emphasise that the voucher scheme is per premise, so the village could pool their vouchers to achieve an interim broadband solution.
