


BAND CONCERT

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We need more homes for children in care in Derbyshire. That's why we've launched a countywide campaign to help us find foster carers and adoptive parents. We've currently got around 630 children in our care and they all need stable, secure and happy homes whether for a short length of time or longer term. You might have considered fostering in the past but not taken the first steps. We know that there are some common misconceptions around fostering and if any of these myths have stopped you from fostering before, please think again:

Have you ever considered Fostering?

I'm not the right age: We don't have any upper age limits. However 21 is the youngest age that we consider for fostering in Derbyshire.

I don't own my own home: You don't need to own your own home to foster. As long as each child can have their own bedroom you can foster.

I'm single: Our foster carers may be single, married, in a civil partnership or living with a partner.

I haven't worked with children or young people: We offer training, support and development so you're ready for the rewards and challenges fostering brings. If you haven't worked with children we only ask that you've got some experience caring for them through family or volunteering.

I'd love to foster but I work: There are different types of fostering available such as short-break foster care. So you can still foster while working.



At a meeting of Kniveton Parish Council on Tuesday 12th November 2013, the following items were discussed:-

Flooding at the Hillocks – Cllr Bradbury again reminded the meeting that despite work having been completed, nonetheless, a drainage grid is still prone to holding silt – continue to monitor.

Newhouse Farm – DDDC Officer visiting monthly and schedule of reduction in place.

Snow Clearing 2013/14 – Cllr Bradbury attended DCC Information meeting and reported back to the Parish Council. Councillors will ensure bins are filled with the approach of winter and the Clerk will contact Mr Hammersley to ensure that where possible, local roads will be kept open.

Highways – Reported that water was collecting on the 5035 near the Ketch.

Footpaths – Clerk informed meeting that the DCC Miner Maintenance grant has been increased to £495. Programme of work for Spring 2014 to be discussed at next meeting.

Standing Orders – Revised Model Standing Orders to be discussed at the next meeting.

Finance – Early information received re Parish Precept 2014/15.

Planning

13/00572/FUL – erection of 2 agricultural storage sheds and formation of raised deck area for Mr A Staniforth at Croft Dene. Granted with conditions.

13/00710/FUL – erection of wind turbine, 75 metres to hub and 100 metres to blade tip with associated construction of access track and substation for Mr J Archer at Bradley Pasture – noted that **this development is not in Kniveton Parish.**

Comments, Observations, items for next meeting - Cllr Ratcliffe outlined her work looking into measures for reducing vehicle speeding through villages within the Carsington Cluster.

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

She was grazing in the fields and she looked very well and happy. The villagers have built her a little house and were delighted to tell us she is pregnant and expecting her foal ion early March.

We then drove to the village where our second donkey will live. The villagers were over the moon to hear they would receive the gift of a donkey .She will arrive in three months time when she (and her handler) have finished 'Donkey School!'

So, altogether, it was a very exciting and rewarding visit to Gambia yet again.

Derbyshire police are asking people to take extra safety steps to protect their personal files from computer fraudsters. The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has recently received a number of reports relating to malicious software known as CryptoLocker. The ransom-ware virus is mainly spread through emails attachments and can take over personal files such as images and documents.

After the malware scam has been downloaded onto a computer a pop-up page will launch asking for a payment to remove the software.

Detective Constable Julie Wheeldon from the East Midlands Fraud and Financial Investigation Unit said: "Malicious software, such as CryptoLocker, can be destructive but thankfully there are simple steps that you can take to prevent yourself from becoming a victim.

"Installing security software on your computer and ensuring that you discard any emails from unknown address without opening them are just some of the ways that you can prevent yourself against this type of fraud".

Simple and effective steps can be put in place to further protect yourself from fraud. Advice includes:

- Install anti-virus and firewall software for your computer and set these to update automatically.
- Do not open email attachments from unknown sources, especially if it is something that you are not expecting.
- Set your web browser to the highest level of security to prevent against malware and computer crime.

Try to make regular backups of your files and store them safely.

Police are becoming increasingly concerned for the safety of Chief Inspector Tim Frohwein who has been missing from his home in Buxton since Sunday November 17.

Tim is believed to have left his home sometime after 1.20pm and someone he knows saw him walking along the Old Roman Road out of the town at about 1.30pm. Assistant Chief Constable Dee Collins said: "We know at that time there were several off-road bikers and about 20 ramblers in the area and we are sure they will have seen Tim as he walked into the countryside. "We have no idea which route he took so it is vital that we talk to people who saw him.

"This is completely out-of-character for Tim and as the weather has been so cold recently we are very worried about his welfare." Tim is 6ft 3ins tall and has dark hair and glasses. He was wearing a ¾ length dark coat, pale blue shirt and brown jeans. He was probably carrying a walking pole. Extensive searches by police and Mountain Rescue volunteers have been conducted since his disappearance. Those searches are continuing. **Anyone who can help the police investigation should contact officers on 101.**
