#### WHIST DRIVES




#### CHURCH NEWS

#### LOCAL BEAT OFFICER UPDATE - April / May 2009



Things have been a little quieter on our area these past few months. Overnight on the 29<sup>th</sup> January 2009 the Bentley Brook Inn was broken into and items stolen. Some of the stolen property was found abandoned at Cubley. Staffordshire have also suffered a number of burglaries, and car crimes that are similar to ours. We have had some extra patrols out, at the same time as Staffs Police, to try and combat this and gain intelligence and trace possible offenders

Suspicious callers at an address in Kniveton were reported to us on 30th January. This is in an area where we have had similar reports before, Ashbourne side of the village. A few days later we had a similar call in Ashbourne. Police attended and checked out a number of people, who were legitimate callers. Some motoring offences were dealt with and they were given advice about the timing of their calls. Please keep reporting suspicious people and incidents. I appreciate it can frustrate people when I ask you to keep doing this, and we don't always get out to your reports because of other incidents occurring at the same time. We do appreciate the calls, and they are very worthwhile. Your call may just be the one with a bit of luck attached that brings in a really good result.

At around 8pm on 1<sup>st</sup> February 2009, a vehicle collided with a stationary Ford Escort parked in Tissington. The offending vehicle failed to stop and made off towards the Ford area. The owner of the Escort has had their car written off, will have to cover the excess on the Insurance, and had the inconvenience a collision brings. Had the person stopped, left details, it may not have been a Police issue. If anyone has any information, saw anything that may relate to this, please let me know. Also at Tissington around the 4<sup>th</sup> February 2009, we had a number of Chickens stolen from a coup. A similar incident has occurred over in Staffordshire.

Towards the end of February at Thorpe Village Hall, on a number of occasions the meeting was disturbed by someone throwing clods of earth at the door. A number of boys have been spoken to after a similar incident at Mappleton and been given advice about their behaviour. We are very fortunate in that we have very little nuisance behaviour in our villages, and we do want to try and keep it that way. Please report any such problems to us, at the time it occurs, if at all possible, so we can try and nip it in the bud.

At around 0520 hrs on the 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2009, at Parwich, a local resident was disturbed by clattering and banging outside. He saw a vehicle drive away from the area, which was described as a small reddish van. The van left as the house lights were switched on. Details were passed to us, and it has resulted in some good intelligence with liaison with other Police Forces. No offences were committed around the area that night but it was an excellent call to us.

At Kniveton, during the 5<sup>th</sup> March 2009, a property at Kniveton was visited by two suspicious men claiming to be there to check on the Burglar alarm. The occupier was not present and the person who dealt with them refused them entry. If you are ever in doubt with unexpected callers always make them stand on the doorstep, until you have checked out their identification with their company, or with us. Each month I do include a number at the bottom of the page for Severn Trent Water. One of the most favoured ways of gaining entry by distraction is to claim to be from the Water Board. If in doubt , please use the number below.

On 12th March 2009 we had the Tissington Safer Neighbourhood Team Community Forum, this time held at Kniveton Village Hall. A small group of people attended and we discussed a number of issues, including road safety issues. The meeting heard that Operation Blodwen, which related to overgrown verges obstructing junctions, along with some other road safety concerns was being closed. Members of the public are encouraged to use the Call Derbyshire number 08456 058 058 to report verges that restrict views, potholes, icv roads, or any other highways issues. This number is the County Council call centre. They will take details and get someone to look at the issue. The number can also be used for stray dogs, trading standards issues, any issue that the County Council may deal with. Currently running on our area is Operation Coriander. This relates to Madge Hill, Kniveton. Please report any 4 x 4s, off road motor bikes that are using the lane to us. Please try and do so at the time, and give the direction of travel. Also now running is Operation Oilseed. This relates to pupils unruly behaviour on some school buses. Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School has some concerns over pupils behaviour on the school buses, in particular on the journey home. They dealt with issues themselves by speaking to pupils and parents and, if need be, will remove bus passes. They have asked us to assist and we will be doing random 'ride a longs' on the school buses that are causing concern. Some of these are on our area. The next meeting is going to be held on Thursday 25th June 2009, at Thorpe Village Hall, at 190 hours.

#### **GAMBIA UPDATE**

Mrs.Cartlidge and I have just returned from a visit to our partner school in Gambia during February half term. It was a very fraught visit as the school was in danger of closing due to a variety of issues. So, we spent most of the time working out a rescue package and visiting Gambian bank managers (a very laborious, laid back experience!) I even had to lead a parents' meeting for 120 Gambian parents-a daunting task but one that was hilarious as I forgot I had an interpreter and started to chat away as I normally do , forgetting to stop every now and then and give her chance to translate into Wolof! We are sure the school has a good chance of surviving now and will continue to raise funds to help them.

We also visited the goats and chickens we purchased last October with money kindly donated from local people. Our seven chickens have now grown in number to 17! Merle and Lester, the two goats, are doing well, although the baby goat, Little Dotty, sadly died. The vegetable gardens are producing lots of food for several families now and the well continues to change their lives

We also visited the family of the dead deputy Headteacher, Aunt Elizabeth. The father was overwhelmed that people in Kniveton are still thinking about him. The gifts of money, clothes and shoes brought him to tears.

We are hoping to return at the end of May and will update you on the fascinating lives of the Gambian people we help. Lynn S. Board

#### E-Victims

Everything is moving online: shopping, government forms and even keeping up with friends and family. Unfortunately, there are also risks online.

Here is a website that can help if you are worried or get in trouble online. www.e-victims.org is the only website that offers advice to victims of e-crime and other online incidents. It is a free online service offering easy to use practical advice. The website provides factsheets on e-shopping, identity theft, Internet scams and more. It provides advice on a range of online issues. You can read through the Q&A section or ask your own question.

If you are a victim of e-crime, www.e-victims.org will help you understand what went wrong and whether you should report it. The E-Victims Organisation is a not-for-profit company that is run by volunteers to help all Internet users stay safer online.

MAPPING KNIVETON'S UNDULATIONS – 2009 In the early 1970s, a young Martin Wildgoose .from Close's Farm, developed his regularly ploughed and used for growing food on a three-year crop rotation: wheat interest in archaeology by carefully plotting all the Ridges and Furrows in Kniveton fields on to a 6" OS. Map. Ridges and Furrows give permanent pasture an undulating, corrugated appearance marking the remains of medieval strip fields that were and barley in year one, peas and beans in year two and left fallow in the third year. The snow in Kniveton during the 2008-9 winter, combined with low sun levels, showed the undulations to perfect effect, and as Martin's map went missing when he and his family moved north to the Isle of Skye in the late 1990s, it is necessary to repeat the exercise during Spring & Summer 2009. Also – there is no Enclosure Map for Kniveton in the Derby Record Office. I have tried using "Google Earth", but too many of the images are inconclusive, so field walking is the solution!

The Medieval Open Field System usually consisted of three,or more, large, hedgeless "open fields" which were farmed in strips. Each farmer was allocated a number of strips distributed around the fields to ensure a fair share of good and less good land. Typically, in Derbyshire each strip measured 11 yards wide by 220 yards (a furlong)

making about a quarter of an acre in area. Some strips were owned by the Lord of the Manor (the demesne) and the Church (the glebe land). Land left uncultivated was called the Common, with villagers having grazing rights. Current belief is that the ridges were not created accidentally, but were developed to ensure easy drainage of the seedbed. The furrow was a combined open drain and ownership boundary.

In Medieval England the making of the ridges must have been a challenge. Early ploughing technology consisted of a single-blade, non-reversible plough throwing soil to the right, drawn by up to six oxen, in pairs. Horses were considered too valuable to use for ploughing; they were for military use. Assuming you could persuade your oxen to plough in a straight line, the problem came at the end of the furrow, when you wanted to turn round. So often the ridges were not straight, but in an elongated, reverse "S" shape to aid turning. The ridges, therefore, were made by ploughing in a clock-wise spiral, starting in the middle of the strip and eventually ploughing round the outside edge. An anti-clockwise motion was adopted in the fallow season to move some soil back towards the furrow and avoid cutting too deeply into the infertile subsoil.

I am hopeful that the Kniveton survey will give us a picture of the village's Open Field System, including the extent of the Common Land; in fact a plan of the village before the enclosure process. It will be fascinating to see to what extent the strips were affected by the topography of the village and whether we can recognise a second wave of ridge and furrow which was created in the late 18<sup>th</sup> and early 19<sup>th</sup> centuries. Often called "Napoleonic Ridge & Furrow" or "narrow rig", it was a response to increase the amount of corn at a time when Napoleon was creating mayhem throughout Europe.

Afterthought: Martin Wildgoose is now Co-Director of an archaeological project on the Isle of Skye. See <a href="https://www.high-pasture-cave.org">www.high-pasture-cave.org</a> for the website, including a dramatic photograph of Martin contemplating the "Cave of the Speckled Horses", a site at the foot of 110 metre cliffs constantly battered by the sea. A far cry from field walking in Kniveton in the 1970s!!

#### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

At the meeting held on the 24<sup>th</sup> March it was stated that there is a survey being carried out on vehicle speeds through the village. Currently it is felt, by the County Council, that there is little justification for extra signage through the village. Discussions are continuing.

Since the trees have been cleared on Madge Hill the road is suitable for walkers. The current temporary restrictions will continue until the road is fully repaired. There is evidence that off roaders and motor bikes are still using the road illegally.

In previous years daffodils were planted in the village verges to enhance the appeal of the village, kindly supplied by Mary Smails. Unfortunately it has been observed that people from the village are picking these daffodils. Would the offenders please refrain from picking these flowers.

The investigation on the flooding at the bottom of the village is ongoing. The culvert at the bottom of the village is in a bad state of repair and the situation is further complicated by the fact that it runs under the Old Hall. It is being considered to rebuild the culvert taking it along the line of the public road . The culvert under Washpool Lane is also still blocked.

Fly Tipping is becoming an increasing problem. Councillor Ratcliffe stated that any one caught Fly Tipping will be prosecuted. It is requested that all instances of Fly Tipping be reported to the DDDC or to your Parish Councillor. The authorities will investigate all instances and they have DNA facilities to assist in the detection of the offenders.

The restoration of the Historic mile stones on the local roads is proceeding. The next meeting is on the 28<sup>th</sup> April 2009 at 7.45 pm.
