NOTES FROM KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 9TH Feb

There is no further news on the request for a bus stop to be erected at the Ketch. Bus drivers will not stop there if there is no official Bus Stop.

The Council was briefed on the Official Opening of the Village Play area. Members of the Council were advised that as yet the Insurance for Public Liability had not yet been resolved. Councillor Bradbury stated that he would endeavour to resolve the outstanding problems.

The problem of flooding at the bottom of the village still has not been resolved. An owner of one of the properties effected produced internal photographs of the drain that is suspected to be the cause of the ongoing problem. These photographs were passed to a member of the DDC who was in attendance and he has undertaken to ensure that the appropriate authority is informed. It is proposed to install "Gated signs " at each end of the village in an attempt to slow down traffic coming through the village. These will be similar to those installed at Brassington.

Pot holes etc in the highways would be reported to the appropriate authorities to be repaired.

PCSO Kate Yeaveley who has replaced PC Ian Cooper as our area representative introduced herself to the Councillors and outlined her responsibilities. The Chairman welcomed her on behalf of the Council and the village. During the course of the meeting PCSO Kate Yeaveley—stated she has currently two areas of policing to attend to. Inconsiderate parking on the roads and pavements in Kniveton. She also has to pursue the matter of Dog Fouling in public places and on resident's properties and the failure of the dog owners to clean it up. She stated that she has the authority to issue Fix Penalty fines to any owners failing to clear up behind their dogs. This Fixed Penalty fine is reported to be in the region of £70

KNIVETON VILLAGE HALL ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (and others)

The Annual General Meeting of the village Hall will be held on April 28th at 7.00 pm in the Village Hall. A review of all matters relative to the good running and the well being of the village Hall will be open to discussion. Members of the general public are welcome to attend. This is possibly a good time to remind everyone that there are also other AGMs happening in the next two months. These are the Parish Church AGM and Parish Council AGM (see Diaries for dates and times). It is important that the folk of Kniveton attend these meetings "to have their say" and meet the people who represent the village on these committees. These representatives make decisions on all our behalf's and in their own time and expense strive to safe guard and improve the facilities of the village. In return we should give them our support.

KNIVETON SCHOOL GAMBIAN QUESTS

Kniveton school invited two fellow teachers they had befriended during their frequent visits to Bakoteh in Gambia to spend a week as quest of Kniveton School. They were Mariama Mendy Sarr and Steven Bangali and they teach at the Janet International School which is Kniveton's "Partnership School". The visit was funded by the British Council. Both schools are working on a joint project on "Sustainability".

Each school is working on how Global Warming and Climate Changes effects their lives and what they can do to minimise the effects. There is close collaboration between the two sets of pupils. Mariama and Steven said how much they are enjoying their first trip to England. They were amazed by the White board as they still had Black Boards and the internet had not reached them yet. Lynn and the other teachers introduced them to Tesco and the Westfield Centre and they soon "sussed out" how to buy presents and to spend money. One thing they were both agreed on and that was they loved fish and chips.








KNIVETON'S ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE

One of the oldest surviving buildings still in use, apart from the Parish Church, is HORSLEY HOUSE alongside the B5056, near Fenny Bentley. All the Kniveton Listed Buildings are Grade II, with the exception of the II* Horsley. I was fortunate enough in 2006 to visit with Bob Goodall, my late father-in-law, who had spent many years visiting and working on the house for his former mentor, John Sellors, Ashbourne dentist. During the Second World War Bob was Farm Bailiff at both Horsley and Riddings Park Farms, his growing family living at Riddings Park. Current owners Bob and Christine Cundy have lovingly restored the interior, but it was the loft which was the jewel in the crown, with its "upper cruck truss with face-halved apex and collar" which had the greatest effect on me and sparked my interest. The adjoining barn with jointed supports and beams, each carrying a still decipherable joiner's mark and number to ensure the pieces were fitted in the correct sequence was very dramatic and it was interesting to ponder on the door lintel inscription—"1640 WM, SM." Were WM and SM the original owners?

Another seventeenth century gem is WOODHEAD FARM on Agnes Meadow Lane, near the parish boundary on the east side of the village. Woodhead's 2 storeys with original dormer windows are distinctive, as are the gritstone ashlar gate piers, added in the eighteenth century. Owner David Short has identified internal evidence that the house was an inn at some stage, which raises interesting speculation about the importance of the Lane before the B3035 became a turnpike. The Barn on the opposite side of the lane is also Listed, as is the nearby AGNES MEADOW FARM, first built about the same time as Woodhead but much extended in the nineteenth century. Again of coursed rubble limestone construction, some remaining windows indicate its age – as does the central brick chimney stack. One can imagine a thriving hamlet based on the two farms above.

In the centre of the village is another grouping of seventeenth-century buildings, the oldest of which may be BROOK FARM, home of David Bott. The exterior of the farmhouse is rather unprepossessing, but like Horsley House, Brook Farm is a cruck-frame construction—there is "one internal cruck-frame with straight blades, arched tie-beam, collar and spurs (removed)" according to the 1967 Derbyshire Archaeological Journal. The house has low ceilings, central chimney stack and evidence of original chamfered sill windows. Adjacent The Old Hall is detached and impressive, with its distinctive large, projecting chimney-stack on its south elevation and evidence of Window Tax avoidance measures. The land was transferred to Church Farm in recent times but it is again interesting to speculate whether The Old Hall was at one time the seat of Kniveton's Lords of the Manor, Dr Bromley Kniveton, descendant of the original thirteenth-century important village family, certainly thinks so. The other Listed Building in this group is Brook Cottage, previously listed as Brook House. Above the moulded stone doorcase on the left of the house is an inscription "IB 1695", though I have not, as yet, found it.

I feel as though I have barely scratched the surface of Kniveton's intriguing architectural architectural history – much remains to be done. At the moment, thanks to the kindness and generosity of Mrs Gwen Sargeant, I am researching the documents and deeds of another of Kniveton's interesting buildings – Church Farm. More anon!
