SCHOOL CHILDREN'S SAFETY

A meeting was held in the Village Hall on the evening of 19th July arranged by the County Council Planning Department whose two representatives chaired the meeting. They emphasised that their main concern was the safety of the school children during the period of parking at the start and finish of the school day. There was much discussion over the lack of organised parking arrangements for parents and the access of other vehicles such as milk tankers etc during these periods. Despite lengthy in depth discussions no viable solutions were forthcoming. However, the points raised during the discussion were noted by the Council Representatives and a further meeting on this matter is anticipated.

Operation Christmas Child – Shoe Box Project

It's that time of year again when we begin to think about packing shoe boxes with goodies. Most of you know by now what this involves, but for those who are new to the idea here is a brief explanation.

The idea is to cover and fill a shoe box (no boot boxes, please!) with small gifts to send to children living in difficult circumstances, for example in countries affected by war, poverty, or disease. The countries covered by the UK operation are typically countries in the middle east, and some African countries. We are not told until September where our boxes will go, but in the past they have gone to Serbia, the Ukraine, Kyrgyzstan, Belarus.

The cost of filling a box will obviously vary, but I have done one costing just £6. It is not necessary for everything to be new, but anything going in should be in good order and working. If battery toys are included it is helpful to include a spare battery or two. It is very disappointing to receive a gift which doesn't work. Clothes are not generally accepted, but there are exceptions, e.g. hat, scarf, gloves. These can be hand-knitted. Please don't include liquids or any kind, nor any food. If including sweets (not chocolate) please ensure it has a sell-by date of at least March 2012. Story books are not accepted because of the language – English is not usually understood. School items are very useful as this enables children to go to school. You choose whether to make the box for a boy or girl, and decide on the age group – 2 – 4years, 5 – 9 years and 10-14 years.

This is something you can do as a family or a group. It is worth sharing with a friend and taking advantage of 'buy one get one free' offers. Do have a go. It is great fun and fills a real and personal need. Remember, it is a Christmas gift – the equivalent of our Christmas stockings. If you want more information please give me a ring. The boxes will be received into the Chapel and blessed at the Family Service on 27th November.

Notes from the Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 5th July 2011. The following items were discussed.

Traffic Calming Measures – The Parish Council is working towards installing portals at either end of the village. Plans have been posted on the village notice boards for public consultation.

Playing Field – An agreement between the Parish Council, Kniveton School and DCC re maintenance of the facility is awaiting the final draft.

Highways – DCC Cllr Purdy is to follow up the recurring pothole at Hillocks. Reported that overgrown hedges adjacent the raised footway on Longrose Lane is causing an obstruction. Further to the parking issue outside the school, a site meeting is to take place on 19th July with representatives from the school, the governing body, the parish council, local police and residents.

Footpaths – Noted that the Jitty is in need of attention; a Conservation Group to be approached.

Planning – Change of use of land to facilitate erection of 4 yurt tents at Riddings Park Farm has been granted with conditions. Erection of non-illuminated free standing directional sign for Mrs Martin has been granted with conditions.

Next Meeting – Tuesday 20th September 2011 commencing 7.45 pm.

We get them from Wildgoose Caravan Park, Mary Smails little commune and camp site, Standlow Lane, Standlow Farm and the rest of the village.

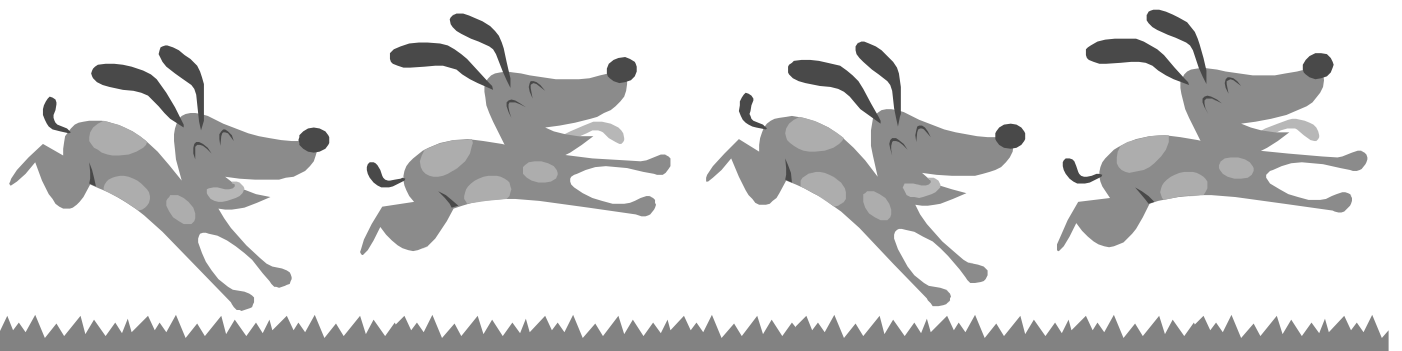
Dog walkers travel along the footpaths from the main road to Wood Lane and use Longrose Lane as a route back home.

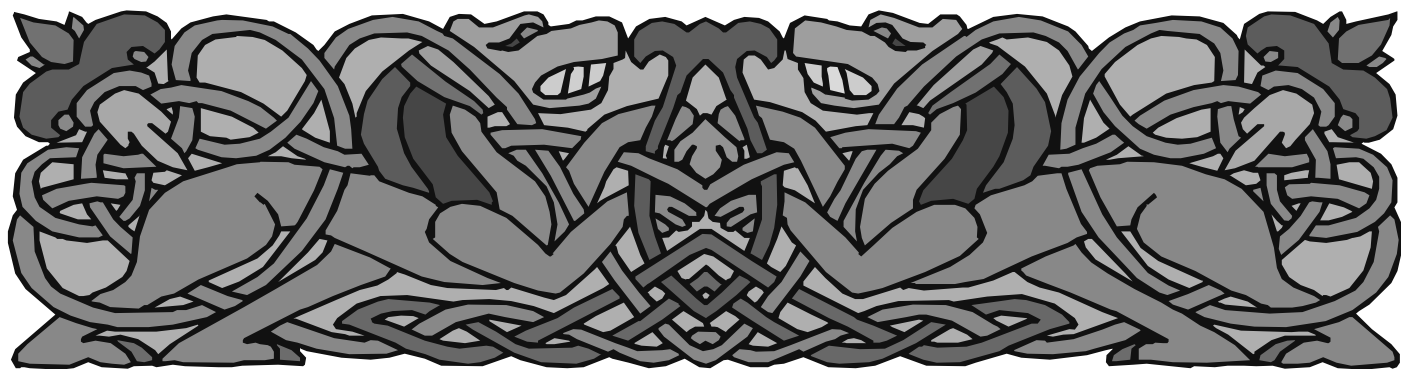
Perhaps the "Official concerned" could take this into account before pointing the finger at us.

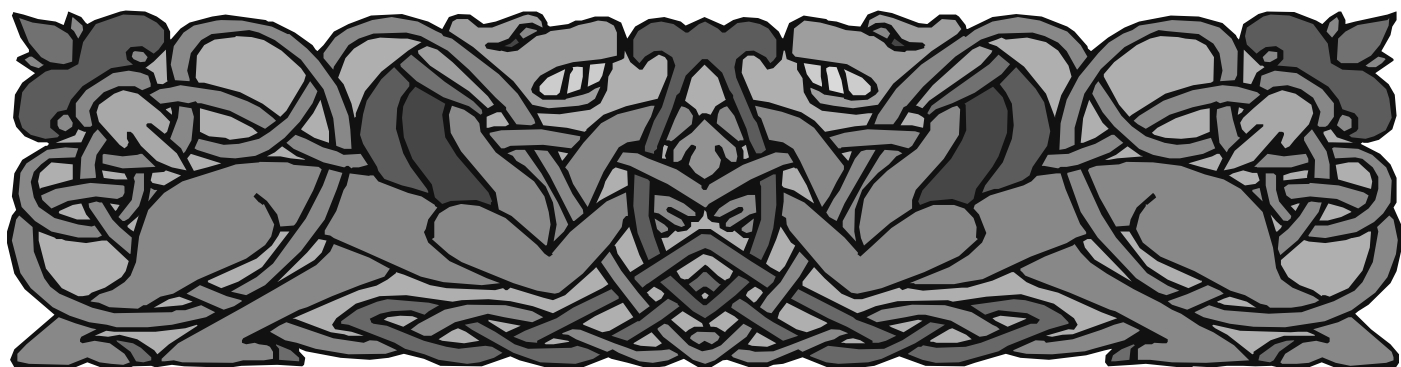

WHY THE REFUSE SERVICE HAS TO CHANGE

When I wrote about this in the Kniveton News a little while ago it was to announce that August 2012 would see a fundamental change to the refuse collection service operating in the Derbyshire Dales when the present contract with Veolia comes to an end after 12 years.

Readers will be aware from recent publicity that the service is changing on the 1st August 2011 to take into account that cardboard, particularly printed cardboard as most is these days can no longer be taken to Vital Earth in Ashbourne along with other compostable waste. This is because printed cardboard is contaminated with print and will no longer meet the exacting standards imposed by PAS 100. This change will occur nationwide not just in the Dales.

Cardboard will instead be need to be put in your blue bag along with the other material you have been putting in there up until now. The leaflets in course of distribution will explain the new procedures and there is to be a new sticker to place on your green bin as a reminder.

Sadly however the 1st September will see the withdrawal of the Saturday morning service which has been a convenient and very popular civic amenity service visiting many of our villages. In Kniveton's case this was three times a year – very useful even though the new Household Waste recycling centre was close by in Ashbourne offering a wide range of services every day.

This change has been made not to save money although it does save the Council £45,000 a year. The new contract was not going to include it anyway for the same reasons that are referred to later so it has been decided to finish it now for those reasons. Whilst it may not seem apparent, since Ashbourne opened and generally, the use of the service has declined by over 22% over the last few years. A new Household Waste recycling centre is to open in August in Darley Dale to serve the more populated areas of Matlock, Darley Dale and Bakewell and surrounds. This can only lead to a much greater decline in the use of the service.

More importantly however all the waste collected has to go to landfill. This is not good as it means penalties have to be paid as we are not meeting the commitment to reduce the use of landfill imposed for very good reasons. The cessation of the service will increase the Councils recycling rates 1.3% taking it from 41% to over 42%

I know it will be missed but we can all look forward next year to a better service which will include plastic collection. When we know the outcome of the tendering process for the new contract I will explain the reasons for our choice in later edition of the News before Christmas this year

Many of you will be aware that Catherine and I are extremely enthusiastic towards renewable energy and have a number of initiatives here at Mulino Lodge for both our farm business and tourism enterprise. We intend to continue with this ethos to establish a sustainable new farm.

Sustainable Youlgrave have carried out a large amount of work including-

- Feasibility study for an anaerobic digester (to produce approximately 20% of the village energy needs)
- Energy audits
- Policy campaigning

Supply chain links- advice on accredited installers

This list is by no means all the work carried out and just gives an idea.

I propose, subject to village interest, to request for a member of Sustainable Youlgrave to attend an informal meeting to talk to us about their work and inspire residents to share their experiences and ideas. I would be grateful if anybody interested would let me know or have any further ideas on how to take this forward. Finally, could you please circulate this to any other interested parties. With regard to timescales I would like to aim for a September meeting.
