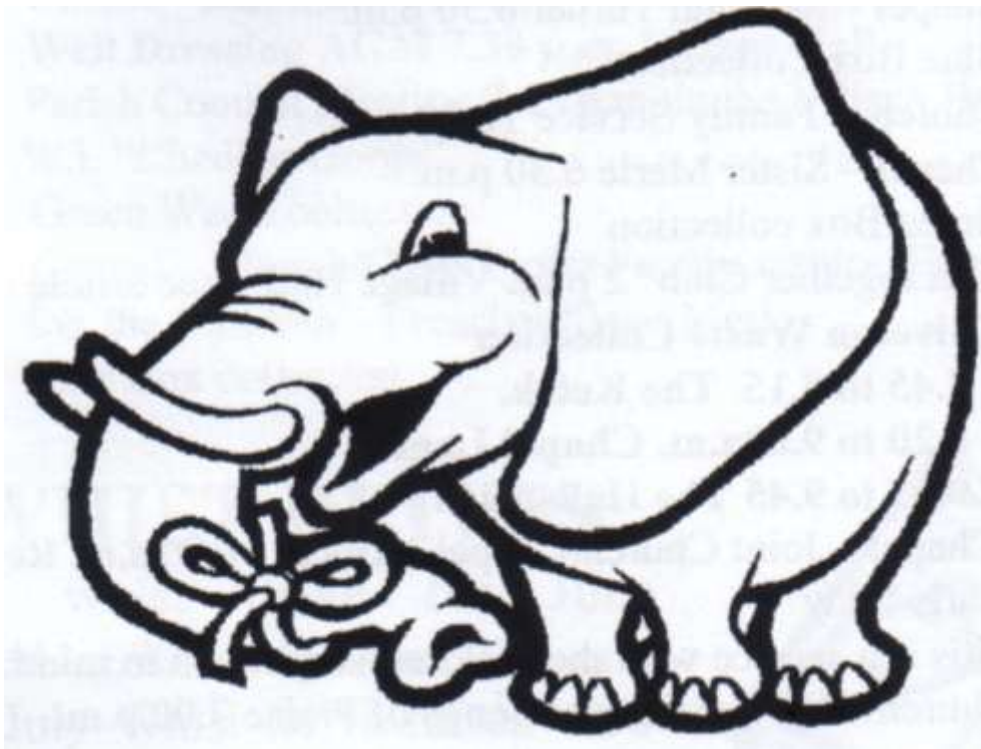

- A Quick Use-Up Pizza using leftover cheese and any favourite toppings you might have in the fridge.
- Olive Tapenade Toasts which turns leftover bread into something more interesting.
- Crispy Chicken Skewers which use a crispy coating made from leftover cheese and breadcrumbs made from slightly old bread.

## KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> July 2012 and the following items were discussed.

**Litter** – Thanks expressed to Cllrs Howe and Bradbury and John Goodall for their work in collecting litter.

**Parish Field** - An issue had been raised concerning the use of the field by the School's Parents' association for a summer fair. The Parish Council was of the opinion that in view of the exceptionally wet weather which had necessitated the cancellation of many local and national events, it was ill-advised of the Parents' Association to go ahead with the summer fair. Conscious of the new agreement re usage of the field by the school it was agreed that the matter would be discussed at the JPF Committee Meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> September and procedures drawn up to formalise usage outside school hours by any parties.

**Code of Conduct** –The Parish Council is required to adopt a new code of conduct. As the legislation has been somewhat rushed, there are still a number of issues which are evolving. To this end it was agreed that the Parish Council would formally adopt the DDDC Model Code of Conduct.

**Standlow Lane** - Concern continues re the need for appropriate signage to indicate the narrowness of Standlow Lane. The problem of inappropriate use and speed causing a widening of the route and damage and erosion of residents' land is likely to be exacerbated by the proposed demolition of two properties and the piling of one other at Standlow Lane development

**Speeding** - As yet, no volunteers have come forward to undertake radar-gun training. Informed by PCSO Cleveley that there may be a possibility that the Bakewell based Mobile Police Station van could be employed in monitoring speeding vehicle through Kniveton.

**Footpaths** – Clearance work on the footpath from James' Lane to Longrose Lane has been completed successfully and to a high standard by staff and students from the Parkwood Centre. Once again councillors recorded their thanks and appreciation to the team and to Barry Wibberley for his help and support.

**Planning** – The Parish Council raised no objections to the following applications:  
Erection of agricultural worker's dwelling at Winn Farm  
Formation of chimney to side extension at Lark Rise

As some of you may know, we have a new rector, the Revd Joanne Whitehead, who will start with us in September. Here's some background information:

**Jo Whitehead was born and brought up in rural villages in the Sedgefield area in County Durham, trained as a Primary School Teacher, with appointments in Hull East Yorkshire and Weston on Trent in Derbyshire and has also served as a School Governor. Since Ordination Jo has been Assistant Curate at the Church on Oakwood Derby for 3 years, which is a Local Ecumenical Partnership with Anglican, Methodist, United Reformed Church and Roman Catholic denominations and she is now completing her time as Curate at St. Mary's Church in the Benefice of Boulton, Alvaston in Derby. During her time in Derbyshire Jo has been a Parish Administrator, voluntary Police Chaplain based at Cotton Lane Police Station in Derby, a voluntary Hospital Chaplain at the DRI within the A&E department. Jo also serves as a Vocations Advisor and is part of the Vocations team for the Derby Diocese.**

**Jo is 41 years old and is married to Chris they have two children Jack who is 16 and Isabel 11 years, as a family they enjoy walking, cycling and spending time with family and friends. Jo has a great love of music and is a trained singer and since moving to Derby has sung with the Rolls Royce Ladies Choir and Derby Bach Choir. The Parish Representatives are of a mind that Jo meets the requirements expressed in the Parish Profile, with experience in all age ministry, a rural background, and work within the Mission Action Plan. We also were impressed by Jo's sense of humour and her ability to enter easily into conversations both during informal visits and in the formal interview situation. We pray that God will bless the Revd. Jo Whitehead and the work and witness of the five Parishes as we enter a new chapter within the life of our Benefice.**

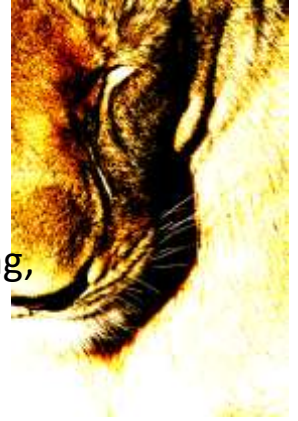

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This is a reminder to members of Derbyshire Alert to be cautious if you receive unexpected emails from banks, etc. For example, you receive an email that looks like it's from your bank. The message may ask you to 'update', 'validate' or 'confirm' your details. It will probably direct you to a website that looks just like your bank's site. It's all designed to trick you into revealing your personal information and passwords so the scammers can raid your account, run up bills or commit financial crimes in your name. This is called phishing.

### **Protect yourself**

Remember: although your bank may contact you by email, they will never ask you to confirm your user name and password by clicking on a link in an email and visiting a website.

**Unsure about an e-mail you have received?** - Some common forms of false e-mails include:

- False claims that people have won on a national / state lottery (known as fake lottery scams).
- False claims that people have been left money in a will (known as will frauds).
- False requests from banks or other financial institutions for customers to verify their security details (known as phishing frauds).
- False requests for help from people to assist in moving large sums of money from one jurisdiction to another, in return for a high percentage fee (known as advanced fee, or "419" frauds).
- False requests to people using Internet auction sites to remit monies owed via routes other than the official settlement system run by the genuine Internet site.

If you receive any of these kinds of e-mails and if you are unsure about any e-mail you receive, the best general advice we can give is do not respond to it in any way. Delete the e-mail without replying to it. Report scam emails to Action Fraud at [email@actionfraud.org.uk](mailto:email@actionfraud.org.uk) To report fraud, get advice or view the latest fraud news and alerts visit [www.actionfraud.org.uk](http://www.actionfraud.org.uk) Action Fraud is the UK's national fraud and internet crime reporting centre.

Should you not already be aware from national news coverage, Britvic Soft Drinks is recalling ALL Robinsons Fruit Shoot and Fruit Shoot Hydro packs, featuring the new design cap, due to a packaging safety issue.

Consumers with any affected product should return it to the retailer for a refund.

## **Police in Derbyshire are warning young people of the dangers of making hoax calls to emergency services.**

The advice not to waste police time comes as schools prepare to break up for the summer holidays. Officers are reminding young people that if they make repeated nuisance calls to police they could have their mobile phone blocked, their parents will be contacted and they could be prosecuted for wasting police time.

In the last year, three people have been prosecuted for making unnecessary and abusive calls to Derbyshire police with punishments including a restraining order, fines and a 12 month conditional discharge.

In June a man was issued a fixed penalty notice for making nuisance calls to police.

Chief Inspector Tracy Harrison, from the force's contact management department, said: "Public reporting is an important part of the fight against crime and any attempt to disrupt this service will be investigated thoroughly. "Every time someone misuses the 999 they are potentially putting others lives at risk. This is especially true when we receive a large number of nuisance calls as it could impact on how quickly other emergency calls are answered.

"This behaviour is unacceptable and we will continue to actively pursue those who make malicious calls." Safer Neighbourhoods officers are also visiting schools speaking to pupils about nuisance calls and also when to call 999 and when to call the non-emergency number 101.

On average, Derbyshire police receives 385 calls per day on the 999 number and around one third of these are not genuine emergencies. You should only call 999 in a real emergency - when a crime is happening, when someone suspected of a crime is nearby or where someone is injured, being threatened or in danger.

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Trading Standards are warning Derbyshire residents to be aware of unsolicited telephone calls from businesses claiming to offer “free” burglar alarms, following a number of reports that such businesses are targeting elderly and vulnerable consumers in the county.

The callers may mislead people into believing that the alarms are ‘free’ and that the business is working with the police. They may also suggest that crime is rising in the consumer’s area. They will persuade people to have a subsequent home visit which in practice can become a pressurised sales pitch, often lasting for hours.

The alarms offered may well be free but the cost of maintaining and monitoring the system will be very expensive and the agreement can last for many years. Claims are also often made about alarms being directly linked to police stations, which is not the case.

Trading Standards advice is to be very cautious of such calls. If you do buy anything costing over £35 from a trader at your door, then the law gives you a 7 day “cooling off” period to change your mind. The trader must give you a written cancellation notice if you agree to buy the goods or service. Failure to give this notice is a crime.

If you are considering purchasing an alarm or other security system for your home then it is highly recommended that you obtain several quotes before making a commitment. You can also find reputable traders on the Derbyshire County Council Trusted Trader Scheme. Officers vet all traders on the scheme for trustworthiness and to ensure that they comply with consumer protection laws.

# KNIVETON WI



At our June meeting our guest speaker was Barbara Egerton who has been a beekeeper for over thirty years. Her first three years were unsuccessful, but this didn't deter her and she now has a successful business.

Barbara went on to tell us about a year in the life of beekeeping.

The bees mainly produce honey from May until August. During the winter months the bees huddle together for warmth, rotating themselves from the outside to the middle. We learnt about the life of the hive from the queen bee, the workers and the drones. How the communication system works among the bees, doing a figure of eight dance indicating direction to find nectar, and how they work with the magnetic fields of the earth. What amazing insects they are! They are at present suffering with a mite, which feeds on them. Research is ongoing with this problem.

We then learnt about the products produced from bees, and how they are put to good use. Pollen added to honey helps people who suffer from hay fever and asthma. Honey can be put on wounds to help with the healing process. Honey never deteriorates, even samples have been found in the pyramids, which are still edible.

After wards, we sampled the honey, with many pots being bought.

Barbara was thanked by our own Barbara (Palmer) for a most enjoyable evening having learnt a lot about bees, and how important they are to nature.
