

Sunday 6th December will be our next Holy Communion at 10.30am. Fingers crossed this will be in church! We'll try & update the notice board if not.


Sunday 6th December also sees the Band Concert, again hopefully in church, otherwise in the village hall.

LATEST UPDATE FROM YOUR SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD OFFICER

October/November 2009

Since the 22nd of September there has not been a great deal to report on the area. On the 5th of October an isolated building at a company on Alsop Road, Parwich had an attempted entry, nothing was taken all contents remained in tact. Later in the month on the 19th of October several rocks were taken from a wall at Newton Grange, still under investigation.

Any information concerning the above would be appreciated. Please remember if you see, hear, or are told about someone that is acting suspiciously, or causing a nuisance, please make a note of any details. Registration numbers, descriptions are all very helpful.

Please ring us if possible, at the time. You do not have to give your details, you may be asked for them but you can decline and remain anonymous. The most important thing is that the information is passed on.

During the month of November there have been several incidents to report. On the 5th the Derby Mountain Rescue Team were dispatched to Dovedale near to Lion Rock where a 16 year old female had fallen and sustained back injuries. The Air Ambulance was also in attendance. All was well and the injured party was taken to hospital.

It was reported on the 13th by a resident at Tissington that a white van was seen taking a 'flash' photograph of their farm and on the 14th another vehicle, this time a yellow van was reported visiting a farm at Fenny Bentley asking if they had any car batteries they could have. It is very important that all suspicious vehicles, enquiries are reported to the Police, we can then check them out and update the residents with the outcome.

On the 16th a vehicle (Corsa) was reported burnt out at Alsop Station, Alsop en le Dale. Police attended and found the car was completely destroyed. Enquiries are still ongoing and hopefully a result will be forthcoming and will be reported in next month's newsletter.

Calls for service have been received regarding possible attempts at

interfering with a badger set in the Bradbourne area between the 16th and 17th November. Please call the 0345 123 33 33 number if you suspect this may be occurring in your area.

The ongoing issue with the road closure on the B5056 at Fenny Bentley was discussed at a meeting held at Tissington Village Hall on the 17th. The meeting was well attended with about 90 people there. Many concerns were raised by the attendees and after a presentation by Councillor Simon Spencer several issues were clarified.

We continue to live in area that is low on crime and anti-social behaviour. In relation to this it continues to be one of the best areas in the country to live.

TURBULENT TIMES - AND NO CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS!

One of the most unsettling times in Kniveton's history was from 1640 to 1660. It included the lead up to the Civil War, the War itself from 1642 to 1646, and then the long period of uncertainty, after the trial and execution of King Charles 1 in 1649 – of the period called the Protectorate or Commonwealth – the dictatorship of Oliver Cromwell in the 1650s. "Normal life" was turned on its head with the establishment of Puritan, or Presbyterian, religious practices.

It would appear that Kniveton largely escaped the worst aspects of the Civil War, as it difficult to find any documentary evidence to the contrary. One main cause of the lack of documents is that Kniveton in the mid-seventeenth century was a work-a-day agricultural village with no members of either gentry or nobility. During the war itself, support among Derbyshire Gentry was split about 50/50 for the King and Parliament, with nearly a third of Derbyshire families managing to remain neutral. Derbyshire remained on Parliament's side, largely due to the efforts of Sir John Gell of Hopton Hall, Governor of Derby and Colonel of the Derbyshire Regiment The Kniveton villagers would have had little choice in helping to pay for the parliamentary army.

There are, however, other indications of unsettled times in the village. The list of Kniveton clergy has a big gap in the 1640s & 1650s and the Parish Registers contain no entries for Baptisms, Marriages and Burials for the two decades. Perhaps stained-glass windows had been broken when you see the shards of glass and the Kniveton Arms included in the plain-glass chancel window in the Parish Church. The final indicator of upheaval is the carefully chiselled date of 1663 on the fourteenth-century font. Are these indicators linked, or just co-incidence?

What we can be absolutely sure about is that at least from 1651 to 1658 Kniveton was a full-blown Puritan village, with all that meant in terms of the restrictions on human activities. "The Minute Book of the Wirksworth Classis, 1651-58" details the monthly meetings of the body which replaced the diocese. During these years, gaming with cards, stage-plays, maypole dancing, ale-houses, the celebration of Christmas, infant-baptism and travelling on the Sabbath were all condemned. In Derbyshire, the second Thursday in each month was designated a Fast Day, during which food and "bodily delights" were eschewed. Whilst the majority of the meetings of the Classis were held at Wirksworth, on June 19th 1655, the Classis was held in Kniveton Church when Mr Samuel Charles was ordained as Kniveton incumbent.

We know that the 1660 Restoration of King Charles II prompted another revolution in village life. Priests who were Parliamentary supporters were replaced by "traditional" vicars,



bishops resumed their authority and many of the restraints on personal enjoyment were discontinued. Infant baptism and the celebration of Christmas were resumed, as were alehouses, stage plays and maypole jollifications. The regular Fast Days were discontinued. The privations of Puritan Kniveton may have been soon forgotten, but the evidence remains in the Parish Registers, the list of priests, the date on the font and the shards of stained-glass windows.


