Update on Church Improvements

Hurrah! All the improvements are now complete. The gates frame the approach to church splendidly; many, many thanks to Rob Savidge for all his work in making them & to his family for their patience while he was working on them. The inside sparkles with its new coat of paint, setting off the new kneelers, most of which are now in place. A big thank you to all you who have worked on them & to the trustees of the estate of Mrs Exton for making the improvements possible. A thanksgiving was held in church this morning to dedicate all the new improvements and to thank all those who have given time & money for this work to be completed.

Future Developments

Our focus in the coming year will be on fundraising. Although the bulk of the funding came from a donation, part of it was met by the church, as was the cost of decorating. Minimal maintenance has been carried out in since we first applied for the faculty in 2004 for the improvements and though we budgeted for our share of the improvement costs & the decorating, repairing the porch roof & the guttering were unforeseen costs which have left the coffers empty. We have raised £1,000 this year but will need to raise more in the next few years. If anyone has any ideas for fundraising or would like to make a donation to the church, please contact the churchwardens or any member of the PCC (tel : 01335 344166). Donations via Gift Aid are especially very welcome as we can reclaim the tax.

REMEMBERANCE SUNDAY

A very meaningful Remembrance service was held in Kniveton Church on the 14th November to which all the other churches in the Benefice were invited to attend and the Church was full to overflowing. The names of all the fallen Heros from all the villages in the Benefice were read out at a Wreath laying ceremony at the Kniveton War Memorial.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Traffic Calming and Parking in the vicinity of the school and the Village Hall Car Park was discussed at some length. County Councillor Purdy was present at the meeting and it was helpful that his responsibilities extended to the matters under discussion. Extra restrictions on parking etc by the Village Hall Car Park will be carried out, and these restrictions will be made legally enforceable. There will also be other actions taken against offenders, especially against owners of car parking illegally on the main road, or dangerously and parking likely to cause obstructions. It was generally agreed that the time for talking had passed and it is now time for legally enforceable action to be taken. Councillor Purdy also stated that there is a requirement for setting up a position as "Local Snow Warden" to report to the appropriate County authority in times of periods of heavy snow. There was no one prepared to volunteer at the meeting' but should anyone in the village feel that they would like to volunteer they should contact their local Parish Councillor for assistance in progressing their enquiry. Road repairs were discussed and although repairs are being carried out more needs to be done. The junction at Wood Lane and the B5035 was sited as an example. Councillor Bradbury stated that there is still a problem with Dog Fowling on the actual playing areas of the Sports field. It was agreed that dogs could not be banned from the playing fields, but dog owners are requested to keep their dogs on leads and keep to the foot path and clean up any fowling by their dogs. Dog Owners should not let their dogs fowl the actual playing areas, especially the children's play area.

"Affordable Rural Housing". The Parish Council have not received any response on their appeal for any suggestions or offers for the provision of "Areas for Local Affordable Housing" within the village area. Councillors are still open for offers or suggestions.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held in the Village Hall on 18th January at 7.45 pm.

WHIST DRIVE

The October Whist Drive raise £46.01 which was donated to Church Funds. The November and December Whist Drives will be donated to Cancer Research. John and Nancy are pleased to receive, and are very grateful for the donation of raffle prizes for the December Whist Drive and for other Whist Drives throughout the year. All the profits from all the Whist drives are donated to local charities and organisations. The Whist Drives are held on the 2nd Wednesday of each month in the Village Hall. New players can be sure of a friendly welcome and be guaranteed a very enjoyable evening's entertainment.

HARVEST SUPPER

Once again on the 1st October the Village Hall was full to capacity and everyone enjoyed the traditional delicious two course supper. The meal was followed by a grand raffle of donated prizes and concluded with the traditional singing of Harvest Hymns. The ladies who prepared and served the meal were given a resounding vote of thanks. The Harvest Supper made a very commendable profit of £381 which was donated to Church Decoration Fund.

Blue Box, Blue Bag and Green Bin collections

It has been the practice for Derbyshire Dales District Council to distribute annually to every Household a Collection Calendar detailing all the dates for the above listed waste collections. There will not be a Waste Collection Calendar for 2011 issued this year to every household. However, the Kniveton News has obtained this information for the year 2011 and we will continue to publish this information in the Monthly Diaries during 2011.



LETS TALK RUBBISH

We need to think about our rubbish collection service as the District Council who are responsible for this very important service are in course of renewing it and your views are very important in this challenging process.

At the moment you enjoy a curb side collection of general rubbish weekly and cardboard food and garden waste fortnightly along with newspapers, bottlers and tins on the same basis. This amounts to a 41% recyclable collection still sadly behind the target of 55% we are obliged to achieve by 2020. Unfortunately any recycling into your own compost does not count however commendable that is.

The new contract due in August 2012 gives us a number of opportunities to improve and your views are very very important to us. We want to include plastics in our curb side collection and with that included the choices are

- 1. As we are weekly and fortnightly
- 2. Residual fortnightly food and garden waste fortnightly alternating
- 3. Charge for garden waste fortnightly the rest weekly
- 4. No charge for garden waste, food weekly and the rest fortnightly including garden waste

All the choices have different price tariffs but until we have the tenders we do not know if this will be less that the current £1.3 million or more. All the indications that any of the options might be less which would be a boon to all Derbyshire Dales Council Tax payers.

What is your preference is the important question we need to have your views on - do you want to recycle more (we need to) or carry on as we are? Are you prepared to pay for garden waste collection (approx £45 pa) or not?

Currently we enjoy 3 annual waste collection services in Kniveton (less than some areas) but reflecting our close proximity to the Ashbourne – all this goes to the tip so it is not very "green" and quite costly at £60,000 pa. We are think-

ing of stopping this in 2012 and relying on the nearby service at Ashbourne and the special collection service which you have to pay for. What do you think?

We have to be greener in the future and from 2013 we have to recycle more – we can only do what you want us to do and we are listening!

Dear Readers,

We are the applicants for the micro-generation wind turbine at Agnes Meadow Lane which was recently turned down by DDDC due to being "visually intrusive". This is very frustrating for us, especially as the voting went 8 in favour and 9 against. However, we will not give up on our aims for this farm and are taking it to appeal. Thanks to all the Kniveton residents who support what we are trying to achieve.

Both 25 years old, and from farming families in the Staffordshire Moorlands, we purchased some land and have now made this our home. We have a great opportunity to start this new farm as sustainably as possible, which is why we have applied for a 25m (34.5 to tip blade) wind turbine to replace our noisy diesel generator. This would allow us to be energy self sufficient, help justify a grid connection and feed energy back into the national grid when we have surplus. We strongly feel we need to act now against rising fuel prices and the looming fuel famine.

We keep native breed Highland cattle and Hebridean sheep and work closely with the Peak District National Park and the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust on conservation grazing projects- and looking to do lots more exciting things in 2011 including a sustainable tourism project. If you wish to find out more we are having a charity 'Open Farm' on Sunday 5th December between 12.30 and 4pm with all money raised going to support the Muscular Dystrophy campaign. Refreshments will be provided and raffle prizes are welcomed.
