KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 13th November 2012 and the following items were discussed.

Madge Hill – Reported that the first gate is dragging on the road surface causing damage; Clerk to contact land owner.

Parish Field – Flooding in lower field due to root growth necessitated land drains replacement. Some minor vandalism on gate repaired.

Foxholes Lane – Still waiting on DCC Highways to carry out repair to damaged railings at Brook Farm.

Parking – Monitoring of parking outside the school, both on and off street, continues with the involvement of the Civil Enforcement Officer.

Waste Collection – Cllr Rose reported teething problems with the contractors with some areas not yet having received the new bins. DDDC are working hard to rectify the problem.

Highways – Pot hole reported on Main Road due to sunken drain.

Footpaths – Clearance work on the footpath from James' Lane to Longrose Lane and the Jitty will be carried out in January.

Winter Snow Clearance – DCC policy will remain as last year clearing only main roads and relying on farmers to help keep important minor roads open. Last year, Kniveton Parish Council funded some further clearance on Longrose Lane and Wood Lane. In addition this year, the Parish Council will also fund clearance on Foxholes Lane. However, should there be severe and prolonged downfalls of snow, limited available funds will necessitate the Parish Council reviewing its policy.

Planning – Application received for Alterations to listed building – Installation of ground floor toilet at The Old Hall. *No objections*

Concerns expressed at the number of caravans sited at Newhouse Farm. Clerk to contact Planning Department.

Parish Precept 2013/14 – For the past six years, Kniveton Parish Council has succeeded in maintaining a standstill budget with the parish precept at £4000 which levies a charge of £22.99 per average Band D property. However, in order to meet rising costs and commitments for the next financial year, it will be necessary to both utilise reserves and make a modest increase in the precept representing an additional charge of £2.30 per average Band D property.

When I started breeding Arabian horses 25 years ago my aim, my dream, a fairy-tale was to breed a World Champion. Luckily I kept my thoughts to myself because they were ridiculous ! Breeders go a lifetime without a National Champion yet alone the best in the world !

I've been blessed with some fantastic horses and blessed with some fantastic luck. We've had numerous National and International Champions including European Champions and Nation Cup Champions. The World Champion title evaded me until Paris last year. Not bred by me but bred by close friends Carole & Roy Ratcliffe who have just three broodmares. One of those broodmares is Fforget-me-knot by my senior stallion, Ffatal Attraction and born here, down this quiet little lane early one May morning 14 years ago. So although I'm not 'mother' to reigning World Champion mare CR Jasmeenah I'm 'grandmother' !!

Not happy with the much coveted World Champion title CR Jasmeenah was taken to America to compete in the US Nationals last month. She won her age group with the highest marks ever awarded to any horse competing at the US Nationals and went on to be unanimous US National Champion Senior Mare. This is the first time a UK bred horses has competed and won such a title at this show. I doubt I'll ever see it done again in my lifetime, it is what dreams are made of. When breeding horses we always look closely at the mother and I'm thrilled to have brought Jasmeenah's mother into this world and to have played a small part in this 'superstar' mares life. Delyth

Anthony Sutton 30.9.38 – 8.11.12

Anthony and his wife Joan together with their dog Bee-Jay moved into the village in 1993 and set up home at The Stables. They developed The Stables into a wheelchair accessible home adapted to suit their needs as both Anthony and Joan were disabled and Anthony was wheelchair dependant.

They led a full life with the support of a variety of carers Many of whom you may still be friends with! Both Anthony and Joan enjoyed 'walking' Bee-Jay round the village indeed Anthony would race round the paths on his wheelchair exercising Bee-Jay before racing home again to enjoy a G n T on the patio outside his house whilst observing the traffic going home and chatting to those who walked by.

Anthony was awarded his MBE in the New Years Honours List in 1998 in recognition of his achievements while working for the prison service, a few days before he retired, and was presented it on 26th March 1999 by Prince Charles.

The last two years have not been Anthony's best years – whilst on holiday in Tenerife the discs in his neck collapsed which effectively made him a quadriplegic and highly dependent on nursing staff. After safely getting home to Kniveton he had to have an operation to stabilize his neck and prevent further damage but he never returned home and recently resided at St Marys Nursing Home near Brailsford.

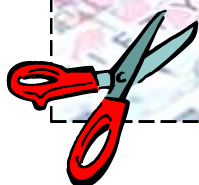

Police are advising shoppers to be extra vigilant and ensure that their purses and wallets are secure, following three reports of theft of purses from handbags at supermarkets in Ashbourne. Please remind your friends and neighbours to be aware of who is around them while they are busy shopping and to avoid leaving handbags hanging on trolleys. they should report anything suspicious to the store or Derbyshire police on 101.



Residents in the Osmaston and Fenny Bentley area have received calls from someone claiming that they were from 'crime prevention' and are working in connection with the police, asking if the householder would be in the next day. One of these residents became quite suspicious after receiving two calls, particularly given the type of questions being asked by the first caller and then the second caller, checking when they would be at home. Police are advising residents to be vigilant. If you have any concerns or anyone turns up without identification who claims they are working with the police, turn them away, then call Ashbourne police on 101 – quoting incident number: 123 of 24.10.12. Police officers and police staff all have identification which can be checked out. Don't let strangers into your home who claim they work with the police.

The guide, created in conjunction with Metropolitan Police Service, is available to download from the force website www.derbyshire.police.uk It contains information and advice on identity fraud, postal scams, investment fraud, door-step scammers and fraud involving mobile phones and the internet. The guide also offers tips on how to avoid becoming a victim, including;

- Only give out your personal details when necessary and when you trust the person you're talking to
- Use a shredder to destroy personal information
- Don't send money or pay fees to claim prizes or lottery winnings
- Always ask to see the identification of anyone who comes to your door. Before giving them any money, take the time to find out about their business and their offer

Be wary of emails claiming to be from banks. Legitimate financial institutions will never ask you to click on a link in an email to access your account and will never ask you for your PIN.

If you have been the victim of a scam, call Action Fraud, the UK's first national fraud reporting centre, on 0300 123 2040 or visit www.actionfraud.org.uk

It has been reported that there may be an alarm company cold calling consumers in the Ashbourne and surrounding areas, claiming they have 7 alarm systems to 'give away', only costing £299 for the fitting.

This company has no connection with the Police.

Residents can get hold of a leaflet containing crime prevention tips on fuel tank security available from most police stations and several oil providers have been given supplies to hand out when they make an oil delivery. There is also a supply of driveway alarms at a discounted price of £20 available for residents to collect from Bakewell and some other police stations.

Some of the tips to help prevent theft of include:

- Make sure that you lock any gates or lock your fuel tank if you can.
- Disguise your oil tank if you can or create obstacles to make it more difficult to access.
- Fit a level gauge
- Consider installing security lighting or CCTV

Avoid leaving any scrap metal on view.

Derbyshire Dales District Council Leader Councillor Lewis Rose OBE, who is also Chairman of the Derbyshire Dales Community Safety Partnership, said: "Funding the driveway alarms and the oil advice leaflets is part of the partnership's on-going campaign to maintain the Dales' status as one of the safest places to live, work and visit in the whole of the UK. In particular these initiatives help our rural communities to stay safe and protect the many Dales properties that have oil for heating or business use."

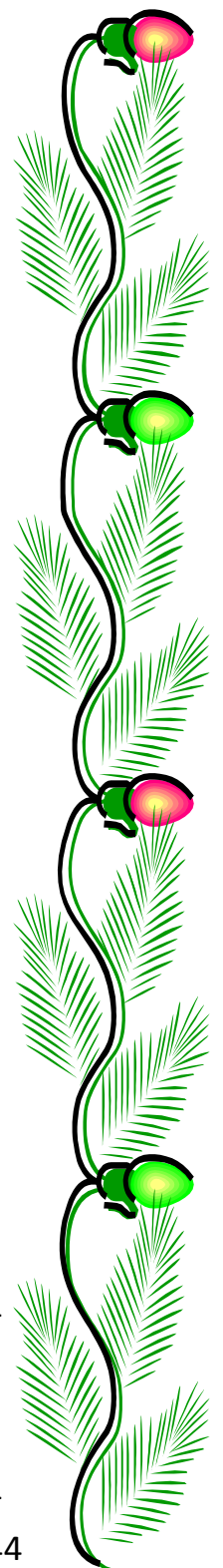
