

CHURCH NEWS

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 10th January 2012 and the following items were discussed.

Village Parking – Continuing problems arising from parking adjacent to the school and at the Pethills/Foxholes/Main Road junction.

Winter Gritting – The agreement that Offcote and Underwood and Bradley Parish Councils work together in ensuring that the routes that link the three settlements are kept open during adverse winter weather has yet to be tested. Whilst DCC would not approve the Wood Lane/Longrose Lane loop being included in the schedule, the parish council is seeking to provide cover for this route via a private agreement

Traffic Calming Measures – A grant towards the cost of installation of portals has been secured from DCC and subject to contractors being appointed, it is hoped that the work will be undertaken shortly.

Playing Field – The Parish Council meeting was preceded by the inaugural meeting of the JPFC, the Joint Playing Field Committee. Cllr Bradbury reported on maintenance work carried out. It was reported that in order to fund maintenance work, the Parish Council and the Kniveton School would each allocate annually £250 towards maintenance. The maintenance fund has also been enhanced by a donation. Committee members were keen to establish the Playing Field as a village amenity and welcome any suggestions or ideas from residents as to how the facility might be used more widely, for example a tennis club.

Highways – Potholes on Pethills Lane and a raised manhole on the Main Road have been reported.

Footpaths – It was agreed that the Parish Council invite Parkwood Community Project to undertake clearing work on the footpath connecting St James' Lane and Longrose Lane.

QEII Jubilee – A working group is to look into ways in which the village can join in celebrating the diamond jubilee.

Planning – A planning application has been received and councillors raised no objections to the following:

Erection of agricultural dwelling at Winn Farm (Cllr Bradbury declared an interest).

The Planning Department at DDDC has approved the following applications subject to conditions:

Two storey extension at Breck Farm

Construction of vehicular access and alteration to existing garage at Cheviot House.

Erection of building for storage of forestry equipment, hard standing and access at Rushy Barn

Tree work at Willow Cottage and High Croft Chapel

Erection of 50kW wind turbine land east of Ashbourne Road

Next Meeting – Tuesday 27th March 2012 commencing 7.30 pm and preceded by JPFC Meeting at 7.00 pm.

Area Police Meeting

An area Police meeting was held at Tissington on the 18th January.

The meeting opened with a warning that the area had suffered a spate of land Rover thefts. Three thefts were noted in December in the locality including thefts from Sainsbury's Car Park. It is strongly suspected that these thieves are coming in from out of the area, such as from Manchester and from the south of the area. It is strongly suspected that these stolen land Rovers are rapidly stripped down and shipped off to Africa. The NFU offers information on Land Rover security. The Police can also offer information advice on Land Rover security.


There has been a spate of Burglaries and thefts from vehicles in the South of Ashbourne especially from Haulage vehicles parked up over night. There has also been a noticeable increase in the theft of Domestic Heating oil. Householders are advised to review the security and the physically checking of their Heating oil. It is imperative that all cases of theft and attempted theft are reported to your local Police. There have been reports of inappropriate vehicle parking near to junctions during the hours of darkness. PCSO Cleveley has been instructed to check for such parking of vehicle and initial advise will be given to owners of offending vehicles.

PC Cleveley was asked if the Police were involved in the village hall parking situation. She confirmed that the Local Police were consulted and stated that another meeting of all concerned is programmed.

It was noted that local Police numbers are down as more Police are leaving and there is a need for more recruits. Information of recruitment to the Police service can be obtained from the Local Police Office. In response to a question a police spokesman stated that the forth coming Olympic Games should not present any problems to local police manning. The next Police Meeting will be held at Parwich on the 10th May.

Olympic Torch Relay 2012

You may have heard that the Olympic Torch Relay is coming to Derbyshire Dales on Friday 29 June next year. A lot of work has gone into attracting the Torch Relay to the district and we hope between us all to make the most of the relay by celebrating the event and showcasing our services locally and beyond.



So far LOCOG (London Operating Company for the Olympic Games) have announced the communities on the route which are Matlock, Darley Dale, Bakewell and Ashbourne. It will also head off to Buxton in between Bakewell and Ashbourne. During it's travel through these communities it will be in what is called torchbearer mode which involves a person bearing a torch for around 300m before lighting another torch held by the next bearer, and so on. At other times, and between communities it will be in convoy mode.

Locally Grown Food: a new business in the village!

We are Heather and Antony of Tom's Lodge, Chapel Lane.

We have a few acres of land just above the village on Atlow Wynn hillside that we are gradually developing into a smallholding using sustainable, traditional and organic methods. Our aim is for it to be highly productive, whilst ensuring the natural environment is preserved or improved.

So far we have planted over 1500 mixed native trees to create a woodland area and give some shelter, and are developing other wooded areas, which we call Forest Gardens, where all the trees and shrubs produce either fruit, nuts or other edible or useful produce. We also keep bees and ducks.

From this spring we are starting a new market garden business, growing delicious salad mixes for local pubs and restaurants, and lots of other lovely vegetables which we hope might find their way on to YOUR plate!

We are looking for about 10 households in the village who would be interested in having a mixed box of our lovely garden produce delivered to your doorstep each week. MAPPING KNIVETON'S UNDULATIONS - 2009

In the early 1970s, a young Martin Wildgoose .from Close's Farm, developed his regularly ploughed and used for growing food on a three-year crop rotation: wheat interest in archaeology by carefully plotting all the Ridges and Furrows in Kniveton fields on to a 6" OS. Map. Ridges and Furrows give permanent pasture an undulating, corrugated appearance marking the remains of medieval strip fields that were and barley in year one, peas and beans in year two and left fallow in the third year. The snow in Kniveton during the 2008-9 winter, combined with low sun levels, showed the undulations to perfect effect, and as Martin's map went missing when he and his family moved north to the Isle of Skye in the late 1990s, it is necessary to repeat the exercise during Spring & Summer 2009. Also - there is an Enclosure Map for Kniveton in the Derby Record Office. I have tried using "Google Earth", but too many of the images are inconclusive, so field walking is the solution!

The Medieval Open Field System usually consisted of three, or more, large, hedgeless "open fields" which were farmed in strips. Each farmer was allocated a number of strips distributed around the fields to ensure a fair share of good and less good land.

Typically, in Derbyshire each strip measured 11 yards wide by 220 yards (a furlong) making about a quarter of an acre in area. Some strips were owned by the Lord of the Manor (the demesne) and the Church (the glebe land). Land left uncultivated was called the Common, with villagers having grazing rights. Current belief is that the ridges were not created accidentally, but were developed to ensure easy drainage of the seedbed. The furrow was a combined open drain and ownership boundary.

In Medieval England the making of the ridges must have been a challenge. Early ploughing technology consisted of a single-blade, non-reversible plough throwing soil to the right, drawn by up to six oxen, in pairs. Horses were considered too valuable to use for ploughing; they were for military use. Assuming you could persuade your oxen to plough in a straight line, the problem came at the end of the furrow, when you wanted to turn round. So often the ridges were not straight, but in an elongated, reverse "S" shape to aid turning. The ridges, therefore, were made by ploughing in a clock-wise spiral, starting in the middle of the strip and eventually ploughing round the outside edge. An anti-clockwise motion was adopted in the fallow season to move some soil back towards the furrow and avoid cutting too deeply into the infertile subsoil.

I am hopeful that the Kniveton survey will give us a picture of the village's Open Field System, including the extent of the Common Land; in fact a plan of the village before the enclosure process. It will be fascinating to see to what extent the strips were affected by the topography of the village and whether we can recognise a second wave of ridge and furrow which was created in the late 18^th and early 19^th centuries. Often called "Napoleonic Ridge & Furrow" or "narrow rig", it was a response to increase the amount of corn at a time when Napoleon was creating mayhem throughout Europe.

_Afterthought: _

Martin Wildgoose is now Co-Director of an archaeological project on the Isle of Skye. See www.high-pasture-cave.org http://www.high-pasture-cave.org/ for the website, including a dramatic photograph of Martin contemplating the "Cave of the Speckled Horses", a site at the foot of 110 metre cliffs constantly battered by the sea. A far cry from field walking in Kniveton in the 1970s!!

At our first meeting in 2012 we had a cookery demonstration from two of our members. Pam Stafford demonstrated two savory dishes, Mozzarella Salad and Vegetable Curry. The salad was arranged in a bowl and then topped with a salad dressing. The curry had a wide variety of vegetables and Pam explained how to



make the stock. Jill Charlesworth demonstrated two dessert dishes, Apple Pan Pudding and Apple Cake. Jill first of all prepared the apple pan pudding showing us how to prepare the base then she topped it with pastry squares placed 'ad hoc'.
