## **KNIVETON VILLAGE HALL**

On the 25<sup>th</sup> April the committee of the Village Hall held their Annual General Meeting. There was a general invitation to all residents of Kniveton to attend this meeting – sadly no one took up this invitation. In his report the Chairman Lewis Rose thanked all the committee members for all their efforts and dedication ensuring that the village hall is efficiently maintained and run. An application for an increase in the rental of the Village Hall by Derbyshire County Council is still under consideration. Details of the increases in running costs have been presented to the Council to justify a rise in the School rental..

The annual election of the management Committee took place. Lewis Rose who has been Chairman for 17 years requested that he is not considered for re election. John Bradbury was duly elected to be the new Chairman. On behalf of the entire committee John thanked Lewis for all the work and effort he has put in over the period he had held the office as chairman. An OBE lapel broach was purchased and will be presented to Lewis as a special thank you for all his efforts.

A review of the hiring rate for the Village Hall was carried out. After much discussion and taking in account rates of other Village Halls it was agreed not to increase the rate and keep it at the present six pounds per hour. The committee wish to emphasis that to ensure the viability of the Village Hall it is still necessary to receive income from hirings by residents and organisations of Kniveton and the surrounding area. The School rent on its own is not sufficient to maintain the viability of the Hall. The committee wish to express their appreciation to everyone who has supported the village hall over the year.

## PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

At the Annual General meeting of the Kniveton Parish Council the Chairman, Dave Lang, welcomed the two newly elected Councillors, Mrs Doreen Kellie and Mrs Liz Howe. Dave Lang was re-elected Chairman and Mike Vaughan was elected Vice Chairman. There was much discussion on the proposed car parking facility for the bottom of the Village. To clarify the confusion and to explain the reasons for the delay in progress Lewis Rose stated that the original proposals had to be scrapped as the then owner of the designated plot sold the property. Fresh negotiations have been restarted with the new owner who is not totally in agreement with the original proposed area for the Car Park. Lewis explained that problems could arise as there could be difficulties with the Highways Department over agreeing suitable access. In reply to queries from members of the public over financing the Car Park Lewis Rose stated that there was no point in discussing finance until plans have been formally agreed and the cost evaluated. He did state that there were sources of finance that were available and these would be explored at a more appropriate time.

No progress could be made on the proposed Kniveton Playing field as Mr McConnachie who was dealing with it is no longer a Councillor. The Chairman will arrange for a report to be available at the next meeting. To clarify queries on the proposed playing field it was explained that it would be more in the form of a MUGA (Multi – Use Games Area). Hopefully the report at the next meeting will shed more light on this.

Residents stated that Standlow Lane is still being used as a race track and short cut from Wood Road to the main road. There were also complaints that the Pot Hole repairs carried out on Stanlow Lane were ineffective.

## **BOB'S BIT**

The village Pump has been out of order for some time. The cause of the breakdown is something that could not have been fore seen. The two quarter inch galvanised bolts which connects the plunger to the operating mechanism, or in other words, the pump handle, had rusted through. I have now acquired some stainless steel bolts which means that there should be no re-occurrence of the problem. I am hoping that the pump will once more be in working order very soon

The water has been tested it is reasonably pure but it lacks the additives Chlorine and fluoricide. Drinking it is not recommended but for other purposes it will be useful if there was a drought. Nature Note. The Cotoneaster on the wall is now in full bloom. It should be alive with bees and other insects. Today there are no bees or insects. Also there are fewer sparrows than last year.

### LOCAL BEAT OFFICER UPDATE - June / July 2007

We've got a few thefts and burglaries to report from the last couple of months. We continue to get good reports from yourselves about suspicious persons and incidents. We are also extending our Ringmaster messaging service to anyone interested in receiving it.

During the night of Monday 19<sup>th</sup> March 2007, a number of outbuildings and garages were broken into around Parwich village. A vehicle was also broken into. A number of tools, childs motor cycles, and a quad bike were stolen.

At around 9.20pm on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> April 2007, two men were seen taking items from the builders container at Fenny Bentley School. Fortunately they realised they were being watched, and left all the items at the scene, leaving the area before Police arrived.

The following night, at Sandybrook, gardening equipment was stolen from an outbuilding, and on the 6<sup>th</sup> April 2007, thieves returned to Fenny Bentley and stole a disc cutter from an outbuilding.

Sometime during early April 2007 a remote cottage at Bradbourne was entered. A search was made though nothing found to be stolen. On Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> April 2007, 4 wheel trims were taken from a Peugeot at Ballidon Quarry. Enquiries are continuing into this, although they have since been returned to the owner.

The following day, at Alsop Station Car Park, a Daewoo was broken into and a handbag stolen from the boot. The offence occurred during the afternoon. As a result of our enquiries, a Male and Female from the Manchester area, have been arrested for this offence. They have been interviewed and are currently on bail, whilst enquiries are completed.

On Monday, 30<sup>th</sup> April 2007, a bungalow was broken into at Parwich. This occurred between 1300 and 1400 hrs, and the offenders gained access by forcing a window with a tool found in the garden. They made a search of the house, and stole a handbag and cash. They also took Credit Cards, and keys to a vehicle. On the Section we have now had a small number of dwelling burglaries, at varying times of the day. Cash, credit cards, seem to be a target, rather than Electrical / Computer items. They are also taking the car keys from the house, and then the car from the drive. At a recent burglary at the edge of Ashbourne town centre, a stolen car was found nearby. Please think about where you leave your keys, cash, and handbags. Put them out of sight, and somewhere not to obvious. Also remember to lock ladders, and tools away. Please continue to report any suspicious vehicles or people.

You have contacted us with plenty of reports concerning people, incidents and vehicle, right across the Beat. These have resulted in people being checked. All were in order, although some details were noted, and have been retained. All understood why they were being checked. We do appreciate your help and really need you to keep ringing in with these reports. Please try and do it **at the time.** 

We have again suffered a few accidents on the A515 and at Kniveton. I have put a report through with a suggestion for further improvements along the A515. At Kniveton a car collided with a house wall and failed to stop. The vehicle has been traced and the driver has been reported for motoring offences. The Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators receive information by a system called Ringmaster. This is a way of passing information out to the Public concerning recent crime problems, suspicious vehicles, and can also be used for non crime incidents such as missing persons. The messages are passed out by Phone, Email, or Text Messages. I am going to try and distribute Information Sheets and Registration forms across the area so people can think about the scheme. We want to try and make as many people aware of current trends and concerns. Anyone can now register to receive this information. If you are interested and want me to get the information and form to you, please contact me on the below number, or call into Ashbourne Police Station.
