A perfect and strong little boy, Ewan James.

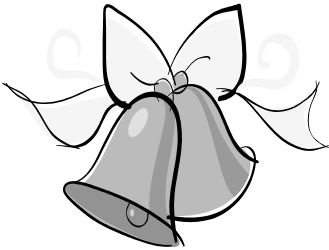

AN APPRECIATION OF THE LIFE OF ROBERT GOODALL, 1916-2009.

On March 31st. Bob Goodall passed away peacefully and painlessly in the City Hospital, Derby – just days after being diagnosed with cancer. Fittingly, his funeral service was held in Kniveton Church on April 8th, exactly 70 years to the day since his wedding in the same church to his lifelong love and partner, Gladys Challinor . Family, friends and villagers filled the church to pay their last respects before the wake in the Village Hall and cremation at Markeaton. During the service, Jane Methuen delivered a superb eulogy. So came to an end the long and eventful life of a village institution, in a mixture of sadness but also celebration of his nearly 93 years.

Bob was born in Golden Hill, Stoke-on-Trent, where his parents ran a small shop catering for the needs of the local coal-mining families, whose financial difficulties in the years around the General Strike had a deep and lasting effect on him. When he was 12 the family moved back to Derbyshire, first to Cubleby and then to Kniveton to take the tenancy of Brook Farm. Thus Bob spent his last two years of formal education at Kniveton School, starting each morning at 10 am, after morning milking!

Space exists only to highlight some of the fascinating mixture of jobs Bob had in a working life which stretched over sixty years. Farming featured heavily during the depressed 1930s and during the Second World War, when he was farm bailiff to John Sellors, Ashbourne dentist and owner of Horsley and Riddings Park Farms. Bob operated both farms virtually single-handedly for the duration of the war.

After the war, he was a miner at Ilkeston and worked on major building projects at Roston Reservoir, Darley Dale and phase 1 of what is now Derby University. He spent 10 years in total at Hulland Products, being particularly proud of his installation around the site of 115 outside lights, each on a 40 foot pole. The system was only superseded a few years ago. He even had a spell as dental technician to his old boss, John Sellors, making false teeth and on one occasion, drilling one of Sellors' molars!

Later in his working life, Bob spent more time self-employed, often on local projects. Of note was his development, manufacture and installation of his patented stock-proof stiles on the footpaths in and around Kniveton, part of his legacy to the village. Unfortunately Bob could not afford to maintain the patent or exploit the idea commercially. During his working life, he never opened a pay-packet; each was formally passed to wife Gladys for the household bills on Dockseys House, bought in 1950, and the maintenance of the growing family of six children.

The West Derbyshire by-election of February 1944 was Bob's first of seven forays into the arena of national politics. Standing as an Independent Agriculturalist and eschewing campaigning, it was his misfortune to be squeezed by a resurgent Labour party which was, a year later, to win the 1945 General Election with a landslide. His candidature featured heavily in the national press. Unabashed by his lost deposit, he

stood in a further 6 elections, the best known of which was the 1967 – “Oakleaf Election” – when his plans to include an oakleaf in his election literature upset the authorities. He won that battle but lost the election. Though he never had the finance or organisation to be electorally successful, he was passionate about the importance of democracy; he did not think the Westminster model was very democratic, especially after Britain’s entry into Europe.

At the core of Bob’s being were his beliefs in the importance of the family, his rejection of consumerism in favour of a simple, sustainable lifestyle and the maintenance of the “green and pleasant land” of England. Family weddings of his and Gladys’ six children were especially important to him, opportunities for well-crafted and honed speeches in his role of bride’s or bridegroom’s father. As the Goodall children inevitably moved away from the family hearth, he was always keen to take every opportunity to celebrate family functions, the last of which was his 90th birthday, when 80 or so of his extended family attended a “do” in the Village Hall. It was indicative of the affection and respect in which he was held by us all.

Right until the end, he retained his love of argument, leavened by a sharp, often self-deprecating, sense of humour. For nearly seventy years he consistently regaled the press, national and local, with letters containing his strongly-held views, trenchantly expressed. Eventually, after trying for years, he was successful in achieving a letter in “The Times” – a humorous slant on the popular “Scottish Widows” advertisement of a few years ago.

Reading through the several hundred newspaper cuttings which resisted attack by damp and mouse, one is impressed by the consistency, humour and idealism expressed in them. Old age is an easy excuse for the cynic. We all know plenty of ageing cynics, but I only knew one ninety-two years old idealist!

The last word rests with Jane Methuen’s eulogy: “Goodbye, Bob, we mourn your passing. We remember you with a smile and a tear, but we shall not see your like again.”

Bob’s family wish to thank all those villagers who visited and generally kept an eye on him in his last years. Their caring and concern are much appreciated at this time.

A THANK YOU

VILLAGE HALL A.G.M.

At the Annual General meeting the Chairman in his report thanked all the committee for all their time and efforts in maintaining the hall in such a high standard. In fact the whole village should be proud of having such a fine and well maintained Hall. There was a special thank you to Nancy Bradbury for keeping the Hall and surrounds in a pristine condition. In the Financial report the treasurer, Ray Frampton, produced an interim balance sheet for the first half of this financial Year. The report showed that there is a trading Loss of £702.50. This is due mainly to the very high cost of Electricity and extra costs in the cleaning of the Hall . The increase in cost of electricity is explained by the increase in the use of the heaters during the day and the increase in the price of electricity. The school will again be approached to use the heating more economically. Mr Lewis Rose OBE who is endeavouring to negotiate an over due increase in the School Rental explained that he is experiencing great difficulty in getting agreement with the Derbyshire County Council . Contractually an increase in the rent is years over due. Both Mr Rose and the Secretary, Ian Stafford, will intensify their efforts. All members of the committee were re-elected en bloc.

Annual Parish Council Meeting.

This preceded the Parish Council Meeting and was sparsely attended. The minutes of the last Parish Meeting were approved, there were no matters arising. Reports were presented on the school, the church yard and village hall. There were no observations or comments from those attending

Parish Council Meeting

Election of Officers- John Bradbury was elected Chairman and Liz Howe Vice Chairman.

Speed Survey The results of the speed survey done on March the 12th for a week, in three places in the village showed mean speeds of South West Bound 29 to 30 mph, Middle of the village 30- 31 mph , and North East bound 30-31mph. Interestingly those driving fast at 56mph were at 1am and 4am in the morning and a couple at 51mph at 6pm, overall motorists are keeping within the speed limits, so better enforcement is needed, as motorists choose to speed as opposed to not realising the speed they are doing.

Madge Hill The temporary closure order has been extended to March 2010. It appears that despite this it is still being used by off roaders. PC Cooper has asked that if anyone sees vehicles using it could they report it to him, if possible with the registration numbers and the direction of travel of the vehicles involved. There was concern that when the repairs are finished and

the temporary closure ends use by off roaders will continue and it will soon be impassable again. The Clerk is to write to the Highway Authority asking that they either repair the road to a sufficient standard for motor vehicles or that it be closed permanently to vehicular traffic.

Flooding issues There was concern and frustration that the County Council have not undertaken any of the works they said they would carry out, to alleviate the flooding problems at the bottom of the village. The Clerk is to write to them to try to get some action.

Washpool Lane The pond in Washpool Lane has been investigated. The stream passes under the track in a concrete pipe and that appears to be reasonably free of obstructions. There is a separate culvert which passes under the pond and is blocked almost to the top with stone. Although the water is flowing now it is only a matter of time until it blocks which will cause water to run down Washpool Lane again. The pond itself is full of sediment brought down in last winter's floods. There is another separate pipe supplying the pond which is blocked. This could probably be unblocked but it has not been done because if the sediment is to be cleared or any work carried out on the culvert this would be easier with the pond dry. There was a discussion about what should be done, perhaps clear the pond and the culvert but that would require a lot of work and how long would it be before it needed to be done again? Perhaps remove the pond and culvert completely. The Chairman asked if this could be reported in Kniveton News and if anybody in the village has ideas could they tell the Clerk or a member of the Parish Council.

Bon Fires – a councillor stated that there was a farm that was burning their used straw. The Council are not able to do anything officially but stated that if it is causing a nuisance to any households they should contact the Environmental Health Department of the Derbyshire Dales District Council

LOCAL BEAT OFFICER UPDATE**June / July 2009**

Overnight on Saturday 14th March 2009, damage was caused to some fencing at a farm between Tissington Village and the Ford. The damage appeared to be a deliberate act rather than accident damage. Damage, in the form of graffiti, occurred between 24th and 30th March 2009 in Fenny Bentley. The bus shelter seat, speed limit signs and bridge were sprayed with grey and black painted 'tags'. Thorpe has also been the location for further damage, with a Vauxhall Caravanette being scratched whilst parked on Church Lane, sometime between 11th and 13th April 2009.

On 10th April 2009 a prowler was heard at the rear of a house in Thorpe, and ran off towards Digmire Lane. Overnight on 9th May 2009, someone stole aerials from cars parked at The Dog and Partridge, Thorpe. We have, in recent months, had a couple of incidents involving prowlers within Thorpe village. Please ring us if you disturb someone or have any suspicions about persons around the village at night.

A prowler was also heard in the Kniveton area, on the 16th April 2009. We recently received a good call from a member of the public in Kniveton, reporting a suspicious person approaching premises in the village. Police attended and checked the person out. He turned out to be the owner of the property. We really don't mind attending these calls. Genuine people don't mind being checked, and most find it reassuring that people take the time to notice things and ring us.

Also at Kniveton, at around 1.30am on Sunday 26th April 2009, a vehicle collided with a wall near to the junction of the Main Road, and Petthills Lane. The vehicle drove off, failing to stop and leave any details. If anyone saw or heard anything can they please let me know. In relation to issues at Madge Hill, Kniveton, I have made a number of checks, and one person has been checked and spoken to about breaching the Road Closure notice. He was going to spread the word amongst the off road motorcyclists to avoid the area.

A New Holland tractor was stolen from a farm at Pikehall, sometime between 28th and 30th March 2009. Callow Top campsite has suffered a little with push bikes being stolen on 2 separate occasions, 11th and then the 18th April 2009. They also had some damage caused by a car driving round the site. A number of people were arrested and are now on bail whilst enquiries are completed. Many people have commented on problems with the Temporary Traffic lights along the B5035. If they do not seem to be working correctly please let us know so we can call out the contractors. Some of the problems have been

because they have had diesel stolen from them. If anyone is seen acting suspiciously near to the lights, or if any vehicles are parked nearby, please let us know so we can check them out.

On 5th May 2009 a resident from Mappleton contacted Police about the speed of a car and manner of driving through the village. Police are making enquiries into the driver who may receive a Section 59 Warning. These warnings can be given for bad driving that fits into a specified criteria. Should a person get a second warning within 12 months Police can seize their vehicle. The person then has to pay a standard fee (around £150) to get their vehicle back. The seizing of the vehicle is separate to any Court action that may be taken, and in effect is an instant fine and inconveniences the driver. In the past we have seized cars, in particular in the town centre, and it is something we will continue to do when necessary.

Over the past month I have attended a few more Parish Council meetings and have some more over the next week.

Our next Community Forum is to be held at Thorpe Village Hall, at 7.30pm, on Thursday 25th June 2009. Everyone is welcome to attend.

We will be having many craft demonstrations including a local artist and a wood turner. So pull on your wellies and come and enjoy a fun day out for all the family at your local farm!

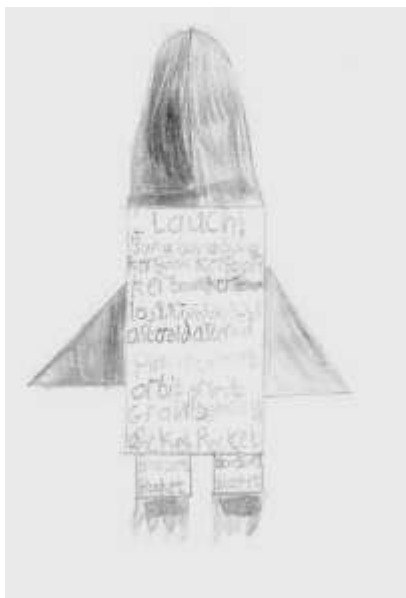

DARE in school

At the beginning of April, class 3 graduated from the DARE program. DARE stands for Drug Abuse Resistance Education & is a registered charity, which first started in America in 1983, and is the most experienced and proactive drugs educational organisation of its kind. It is the only organisation of its kind that uses specially selected and trained ex and serving Police Officers to deliver its program, the aim of which is to educate children about the dangers of the misuse of drugs, including alcohol and tobacco, and to provide them with the skills to avoid violence throughout their school years at both primary and secondary level. DARE actively promotes the use of healthy sporting activities during and outside the school environment. The key message is to promote healthy living and making positive life affirming choices.

To achieve this, each child in class 3 committed to attend 10 one-hour sessions, covering such topics including tobacco, alcohol, cannabis, volatile substances, bullying, anti-social behaviour and different types of pressure. Pupils completed a workbook to record their discussions & role plays on each topic. At the end of the 10 weeks they held a special assembly to parents & governors, where they presented what they had learnt during the course and were awarded a certificate by their DARE tutor, Mr Stuart Wright.

Well done to all who took part! - and here are some of your comments about the course:



"now I know never to take drugs and say no to tobacco"

"I have learned ... to help my self-esteem and how to make safe and healthy choices in my life"

"we also learnt about volatile substances, cannabis and alcohol and the way they can affect us"

CHURCH NEWS

Here's a piece on Sunday's service, words mostly by Jane & Sunday's service, just pulled together by me. Thank you, Jane, for your input.

On Sunday 17th May we came to the end of Christian Aid Week. The Christian Aid Week envelope is pushed through doors empty. When it is collected with a donation it helps bring life. God calls us to live lives that are full, lives that overflow with love to fill the empty places in our world. Thank you to everyone who made a donation. It was therefore appropriate that also on Sunday we welcomed RT Rev Dr Philip Marandih, Bishop of Patna Diocese in the Church of North India (CNI) to our church. Bishop Philip is an old friend of Kniveton; he has visited and led prayer in both Church and Chapel on several occasions but Sunday was the first time he has preached in either. He gave an address on the God of love, who calls us to live lives of compassion.

Ashbourne churches are currently sponsoring 100 places for girls in a hostel at the Tahljari Middle school in a remote area of the Patna diocese. Though it is true that state education in India is free (in theory) very large numbers of children are not educated at all. The middle school at Tahljari is not a state school but is run by the CNI. The State, again in theory, pays the teachers, though often this is unreliable but otherwise the costs are met by the Church. It is a Christian school but is open to all faiths, and the majority of pupils are not Christian. Bishop Philip himself grew up in this area and was educated in a Christian High School that was closed for a number of years and which he is now re-opening. This will mean that children in this tribal area can again stay at school to take a recognised qualification at the end of their school career, and go on to Higher education as he did. We wish him well in his efforts.

Hello Neighbours, I've been asked to write a short explanation as to what I've been up to recently! Well, I was diagnosed with Coeliac disease last Autumn, and at the time, I had no idea what that meant. If you are none the wiser either, let me explain.

Coeliac disease (pronounced see-liac) is a serious illness where the body's immune system reacts to gluten in food, making the body attack itself. It effects 1 in 100 people in the UK, but 1 in 8 of those do not know they have it, as diagnosis takes on average 13 years!

In the meantime, sufferers can experience a wide range of symptoms including upset tummies, vomiting, severe headaches, lethargy, bloating. There is no cure, the only treatment is a life-long strict gluten free diet. It is not a faddy diet, or even a choice, as if people with the disease continue to eat gluten they may develop osteoporosis, bowel cancer or infertility problems.

Gluten is found in wheat, barley and rye, so bread and cakes are generally off the agenda. Moreover, gluten is hidden in many everyday products such as ketchup, gravy, most sauces, barley squash, beer, and so on...

All is not lost though, there is a fantastic charity “Coeliac UK” who look after us, and they have a helpline and also produce a booklet detailing all the gluten free options available to people like me.

I've been helping the charity by canvassing local cafes & shops to encourage them to be more aware of the
