KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 22nd May 2012 and the following items were discussed.

Annual Parish Meeting

Reports were received concerning the Village Hall, Churchyard Mowing and the Playing Field.

Annual General Meeting of Kniveton Parish Council

Traffic Calming Measures – In view of the cost of installing portals at either end of the village (c £1000) and the very limited impact, if any, they might have on speeds through the village, it was agreed that plans should be abandoned.

Madge Hill – Some concerns were expressed regarding the recycled materials being used on the route surface but assurances have been received that this is only the base layer.

Diamond Jubilee – The village celebration is planned for Monday 4th June at The Red Lion. A small grant has been applied for from Derbyshire Dales District Council. **THE PARISH COUNCIL INVITE ALL RESIDENTS TO ATTEND THIS VILLAGE CELEBRATION AND ENJOY BBQ, FREE BUFFET, MUSIC, DANCING, GAMES AND MUCH MORE . . .**

Diamond Jubilee Commemorative Tree – Some suggestions have been received re an appropriate location. These and any other suggestions will be discussed at the next meeting.

Severn Trent work in Kniveton – Councillors and residents expressed concern re the disruption and damage caused to verges during the on-going work. The Parish Council is in dialogue with the contractors and they have promised to carry out a thorough reinstatement of those areas.

Footpaths – Parkwood Community Project is currently undertaking clearing and surfacing work on the footpath connecting St James' Lane and Longrose Lane.

Standlow Lane – Following last meeting, the Clerk contacted the Highways Department requesting appropriate signage on Standlow Lane to indicate its narrow width and warn vehicles that this is not a suitable through route. However, the request was declined owing to the DCCs policy of keeping signage to a minimum and the availability of appropriate signs.

Parking – Further discussion took place re the issue of thoughtless and dangerous parking outside the school. It was accepted that the Governors, the Headteacher and the Parish Council can only express concerns; it is for the offending parents to respond accordingly and if cooperation is not forthcoming then the police should hand out parking tickets to those vehicles parked illegally

Speeding - Community Speed Watch This is an initiative for villages with speeding issues. It enables the village community to volunteer to be trained to use a radar gun and to log speeding vehicles. A Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team member will offer a short training session for the volunteers, and will risk assess the area to be used. Litter in Kniveton– Councillor John Bradbury is looking for volunteers to carry out an annual litter pick in the village.

Footpaths – The Parish Council objected to the application to add Byway open to all Traffic (BOAT) along Kingshead Lane.

Finance – The Parish Council Accounts 2011/2012 were approved; likewise the Annual Audit Submission to the Audit Commission.

Safer Neighbourhood Policing Meeting

The above meeting was held in Tissington on the 10th May. John Bradbury and Ray Frampton attended to represent Kniveton. It was stated by the Police Inspector who chaired the meeting that this area had the second lowest crime rate in the area. It is good news that we are fortunate to live in a very low crime area but we cannot afford to be complacent and must continue to be on our guard. The Police are on the lookout for a specific White Van which is suspected of being involved in several reported crimes in this area. There has been a noticeable increase in the number of thefts of domestic heating oil. Households that use Domestic heating oil are urgently advised to report all instances and to keep a constant check on the security of their oil supply. It is strongly recommended that all oil tanks are securely locked at all times, and tanks are checked regularly. Any theft or suspicion of interference should be reported to your local Police. There have been instances of theft of cable and metal in this area. Your local police are concerned about this and any person who is a victim of this crime or witnesses any theft or suspicious behaviour are requested to report the matter to the police immediately. The theft of metal cables from poles or ducts can cause considerable communication disruption. Churches should also be aware. The Police stated that they are still concerned about the instances of theft of diesel and strongly advise drivers of diesel vehicles to be constantly aware of this crime and ensure their vehicle is secure especially when parked overnight. Warning signs will be put up at appropriate places along the A515 Ashbourne to Newhaven stretch. The next meeting will be on 29th August 7.30pm at Bradbourne.
