It was good to meet up again after the Christmas break and we had lots to discuss regarding what's coming up during 2018. We have a full and interesting calendar of events to look forward to.



This month our speaker was Emma, whose actual business is Copestone Drystone Walling. The subject was "Waste not, Want not". It was very enlightening to hear just how much food the average household wastes; each person wastes about £200 per year on throwing away food.

Emma and her family decided to try one month without shopping for food. They used foods from their store cupboard and freezer and traded with friends and neighbours for perishables such as milk, butter, etc by exchanging some of their home grown produce. They also had an arrangement with a fruit and veg market trader to take any produce left over that would be thrown away. If they had too much of an item they would batch cook and freeze or trade for cleaning products etc. They became quite innovative with their cooking, preserving, and freezing. It was fascinating to hear some of the ways they used left overs etc. It was quite time consuming for them but it has made them more aware when they shop for groceries now and they always write a list beforehand.

Emma had us all exchanging ideas on using up leftovers and what foods we could freeze and how. She also suggested holding a trading day, where we all brought something we had produced ourselves i.e. Jams, cakes, plants, veg, etc and traded with each other.

A very interesting evening, Food For Thought!!

Our next meeting is on 21st February and our speaker is John Barnett, from our own village and he will be telling us about "Female Transportation to Australia and Tasmania".

.Sally Moseley will be our speaker on the 21st March and her topic is "Peak District Guided Walks" Last year she had some great slides to show us and gave a well informed and entertaining talk. She showed us many places and told us many facts about Derbyshire and it's history that we did not know, and many of our members have lived in Derbyshire all their lives!

Sally leads guided walks in the Peak District and is very experienced at leading themed walks, often with her dog. She inspired us all to go out there and keep exploring and we are so glad to have her back this year!

# **JANUARY MEETING**

At the Parish Council meeting on 16th January 2018 the following decisions were made:

#### Highways

Another traffic survey to check speeds along the B5035 is planned – many thanks to Melvyn for volunteering to help Councillors Barnett and Nelson with this.

The Council is arranging for 2 flowering planters to be placed on Main Street (near the village signs) ready for the Spring. Many thanks to Standlow Farm Cottages for sponsoring these.

Speed Survey - the Council is requesting a new survey at the Hillocks be carried out

The Council is arranging for the flashing that has come off the bus shelter roof to be refitted

#### Planning

Peak Waste delegates Richard Martin, John Partridge and Ian Howard attended the Parish Council to explain that they have applied for a permit to burn grade C waste, which includes none clean wood, on the basis that they anticipate that the Environment Agency may stop sites from burning just A grade (clean wood) waste.

They provided the following information:

Grade B/C wood, sometimes referred to as none clean wood, is plywood & chipboard which contains paint and/or glue. It is burnt at a higher temperature.

The system burning this type of wood has a continuous emissions monitoring package which shuts down the boiler if anything other than wood was in it. A ceramic filter fitted on the boiler guarantees there is no smoke produced.

Controls are in place which are not in place for Grade A burning so the system is more environmentally friendly and, importantly for Peak Waste, future proof.

Data produced shows data of all burnt waste at the time it is burnt, and this is inspected by the EHO.

Peak Waste burn only their own waste not that of other companies and most of wood they burn is Grade A.

#### **Footpaths**

There are concerns relating to the safety of the footpath 38, the footpath that joins FP 9 (at the top of James's Lane) to FP 7 (which crosses over the fields between the Gitty and The Caravan Park). The Council is considering whether to request Derbyshire County Council close it because the path is not needed for public use. There is a cost to this and before spending any money the council wants your views on whether the footpath should be closed or not. Please let Kath know what you think about this.

# Glenys Hulland

Glenys Evelyn Hulland was born 7 January 1946 to parents John and Evelyn Sutton. She was the youngest of 6 children, following Brenda, Barbara, John, Gillian and Bill. They grew up at White House Farm in Offcote where Barbara remembers her dressing up the cat and parading it round in a pram, a sign of her creative life to come.

Later on, she met and married local farmer Frank Lomas and they raised their 3 children, Philip, June and Stuart just down the road at Pethills Farm, here in Kniveton. She was a real farmer's wife supporting her family with cooking, cleaning, tractor driving, feeding the animals and whatever else was needed.

Summer was always a busy time with hay making yet those are some of our fondest memories when the cousins would descend to help out. It was hard work yet such fun.

Life doesn't always turn out how we planned and in time she and Frank divorced and she married Trevor. They met at Richard Lees where she was working in the canteen and have just celebrated 25 years of marriage – Trev says she was the best thing that happened to him.

Over time the family has grown to include our partners, Pip, David and Tina, Trevor's son Andrew and his partner Zara and inevitably Mum's beloved grandchildren -Richard and Marie, Karl, Adam, Josh and Sam, Sam, Rachel and Isabelle. And as they have grown up, the family has increased again with their partners, Kelly, Clemmie and Sophie. Then last year mum became a great grandma with the birth of Archie. She wasn't too happy when this title first went up on Facebook – (she was always a nana rather than a grandma) but I think the pleasures of a new baby in the family outweighed that.

She worked all her life, from the early days on the farm to the canteens at Richard Lees. Full Street Police Station and Wren Park school. Then in 2001, she and Trevor moved to Carsington to manage Knockerdown Farm holiday cottages. She retired in 2008 when they moved to Kingshollow Mews, 3 doors up from Stuart and Tina (very handy for hungry boys passing on the way from school). She managed retirement for 3 weeks then returned to Knockerdown as housekeeper. I'm not sure if it was the lack of a daily routine or being at home with Trev all day that drove her back. She also took on a couple of cleaning jobs to fill her time. One of those was for me when I was working - she had exacting standards so I used to do a miniclean before she came. She ruined so many of her clothes with bleach. She did eventually retire properly last year and this time she stayed retired.

For us, we remember her love and care of us all; she was our rock – she was so proud and supportive of all her family, whatever they needed and was fiercely protective. She said that she never got upset when the three of us got told off at school as she figured we deserved it but it did upset her when her grandchildren were.

She kept a warm, comfortable home where everyone would be fed – even the dogs knew where she kept the biscuits. She loved dogs and they loved her; she was so overjoyed that she cried when Trev gave her Archie (the dog not the baby) for Christmas several years ago. He's now as lost as we are.

We all have such good memories of her food – roast dinners at Easter and Boxing Day, baking with the grandchildren, making cakes for church and other good causes. And there would inevitably be some to take home with us.

Her hands were always busy. I remember her making my dolls' clothes and over the years she has knit, sewn, crocheted, quilted, stencilled, drawn, made cards and many other things. She was a dab hand at painting and decorating, having a good eye for how much wallpaper you would need for a wall. And recently she had started painting furniture, even hand-made oak ones. Trev had been heard muttering about nailing the rest down before she could paint any more.

She loved her garden and had real green fingers; she could make most things grow. Her garden is quite small so she expanded into Stuart's sheep field, growing veg and flowers for all. She loved the colour red, sweets, russet apples, her soaps and shopping - she had patience enough to shop with us all, however long it took.

She was always tanned – a reflection of how much she loved the sun and travelling. We all have memories of holidays with her – from times on the farm, Prague, Krakow, France, Croatia to name but a few.

She battled pain for most of her life because of her arthritis but she never let it stop her laughing and she loved to laugh; she once said, "you can't give in to it or it will rule your life". These last couple of years with her heart and her knee problems had been a real strain on her but she would never have given up, she was a fighter to the end.

The last memory is that she always used to say, "cold hands warm heart" to Sam whenever they touched hands as they were always so cold, then she'd hold them tight until they were warm. Now we've had to let go of her hands, but she will always be with us, in our hearts and in our love for each other.

And to finish, a poem by Adam:

Where to start on something like this, More and more I start to miss. You mothered us all from the day we were born.

Now you're gone we feel so torn.

The memories you've left us will be there forever,

Don't worry yourself, we will look after Trevor.

I never expected this news to hit, When it did, it broke me into bits.

But I look back now with a smile on my face, As I see Archie on the chase,

There is still so much I wanted you to see, Even to say, hey nan, meet little me.

Boxing Day dinner - nothing will ever compete,

This Christmas just won't feel complete, Never mind not seeing your smile, Or Sophie coming, and you say, I fancy a new hair-style.
