## KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

### SEPTEMBER MEETING

At the Parish Council meeting on 26 September 2017 the following decisions were made:

### Cats Eyes

Following discussion and input from residents who attended the meeting the Council resolved that the Cats Eyes and White Lines would not be reinstated. The Council wishes to thank residents who contributed to the discussions on this.

### Parish Field

The Council are continuing to consider alternative flooring options beneath the play apparatus to prevent continued damage to the matting.

The tennis nets have been vandalised again and it was agreed that they will not be fixed over the winter. The nets need to be stored away and if anyone has the space available to help with this please contact the Parish Clerk.

### Highways - B5035

Another traffic survey will be arranged and the Council is seeking volunteers to be involved – please let the Parish Clerk know if you are willing to help. The Council has requested that Derbyshire County Council reduce the speed limit from 60 mph to improve safety.

### Flower Planters

The school and the village hall have supported the installation of 2 planters next Spring near the village hall will enhance the village. To help with the cost of this the Parish Council would like to hear from any local businesses that would be willing to sponsor the flower planters.

# Peak Waste Planning Application CW3/0717/36

Ian Howard from Peak Waste explained that the application to erect a building and install a biomass boiler and flue stack was an environmentally friendly solution to reduce traffic and carbon emissions. He noted that the village is concerned about emissions; visual impact; noise and increased traffic. He gave assurance that they would be burning waste wood and controlled monitoring

would shut down the boiler if anything other than wood was in it. A ceramic filter fitted on the boiler guarantees there is no smoke produced. There will be a significant reduction in traffic by a minimum of 5 wagons per week and in turn this will reduce noise. In terms of visual impact, Peak Waste will ensure the buildings would be in keeping with the agriculture farm look and they are discussing more tree planting with the Woodland Trust.

### Finance

Payments and balances were presented and approved. The Council are pleased to report that the 2016/2017 audit was certified.

KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL is made up of six councillors and meets bimonthly in Kniveton Village Hall.

The Parish Council is administered by a parish clerk/responsible financial officer. Also attending meetings in an official capacity is a DCC Councillor, a DDDC Councillor and representation from the local police force.
