Voluntary and Community Services Peaks and Dales is based in King Edward Street, Ashbourne. The organisation is the result of a merger between Volunteer Centre Derbyshire Dales and Volunteer Centre, Buxton.

For 17 years the organisations have been providing transport for older people unable to use public transport. We are very keen to make sure that everyone who needs us knows about us.

The service operates 7 days a week, and can provide volunteer drivers to take people to medical appointments, day care and social events.



#### Rector's Ramblings: Dip in, Dip out, Pop in, Pop up!

One of the features of modern day life is busyness. Life seems so much more busy than it ever used to be. That can impact on various aspects of life: from work, to home, to hobbies, clubs and church. People find it more difficult to commit to things on a regular basis or for a long period of time.

For example, I recently made a "guest appearance" with the Ashbourne Town Band at one of their concerts. I managed to have three rehearsals with them before the concert itself. I really enjoyed playing my trombone after not having played it for many years, and I would love to continue playing with the band. But... when I look at my diary I know that I cannot commit to two rehearsals a week plus the events that they play at during the year. Some people may feel the same about some church services or prayer meetings. If they can't commit to going most weeks, they feel that they shouldn't go at all. They worry what others might think if they only go once every four or five weeks.

In our Benefice we've recently begun something called Pop-up Prayer. You may have seen pop-up shops that appear for a few days and then move on to somewhere else. Well, Pop-up Prayer is similar. Each week we meet in a different venue, on a different day and at a different time. It is advertised each week in the Pews News and on the Benefice website. The idea being that if people find it difficult to commit to a particular day and time, they will hopefully be able to come along to some of these meetings when they fall at a convenient time.

So far, it seems to be working! We rarely have the same group of people each week which means that from across the Benefice there are now more people gathering to pray together than there were before. If you live in the Hulland Benefice and haven't been along yet - why not give it a try? If you live elsewhere, might it work for you too?

There were twelve ringers who played varied musical pieces including Beethoven's Ode to Joy, Sibelius's Finlandia, 'Somewhere over the Rainbow' and ending with a fanfare based on Jerusalem especially for the W.I centenary celebrations. Kniveton W.I put on a buffet, which was very much enjoyed – homemade cakes, bread, and pickles together with various cheeses, pates. The talking point with some of the visiting members was the ingredients in Humming Bird cake!! Some thought parsnips were used, we put them right – it was pineapple and banana. # Methodist Chapel service – special Mission focus on Sierra Leone. 12 September

At our last Christmas carol service, instead of the usual collection we asked for donations to help with the crisis in Sierra Leone. The amount donated was £400. We sent £200 to the Red Cross to help their work in Syria and £200 to two projects in Sierra Leone.

On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> September the chapel service was held in the Village Hall. We invited 2 guest speakers. Rev. Chris Eddy and Mr David Bale.

Rev. Chris Eddy, who many will remember as the Minister before Rev Tim Morris, was the preacher. Chris had served for many years as a missionary in Sierra Leone and has maintained links, and had been naturally concerned about the effects of the ebola crisis. He told us of his work in that country, particularly in Kepia. David (Bale), a member at the Ashbourne Methodist Church, and his wife, Judith, have formed a link with one of the villages, and through one of the villagers, Matthew, have set up the Mambabu Project to help people in the village. This a registered charity, and focuses on 4 separate aspects of need, viz Education, Community Need, Water and Sanitation, and Sustainable Livelihoods.

At our last Christmas Candlelight carol service we asked for donations to help with what was a desperate situation. Because of the ebola epidemic the schools had had to close, with the result that the teachers were unable to work. No work means no money, and the villagers were hungry. The response of those attending the service was outstandingly generous, and, as reported in a previous newsletter, we were able to send a very welcome sum through David and through Chris to help with the immediate need, the main one of which at the time was for food. Sacks of rice, bags of onions, and tins of sardines provided much needed relief from hunger to the villagers. The pictures show the joy on the faces of the people as they received their share.

From donations at the special mission service we were able to give David just over £254, plus £100 to Chris. Chris has emailed me to say that his share of the donations has paid for school uniforms and/or school fees, as needed. Both have written to say a huge thank you to all who gave so very generously. The money will be well and wisely used.

#### **KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL**

The meeting of Kniveton Parish Council took place on Tuesday 8th September 2015 and the following items were discussed:-

**Parish Field** – Meeting commenced with Joint Playing Field Committee Meeting. Various maintenance issues:

- 1) obtaining quotation for repositioning and securing goalposts,
- 2) repair to tennis net pillars and
- 3) school outdoor equipment to be locked away to prevent use during non-school hours.

#### **AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS (AEDs)**

To date, no one has expressed any interest in the proposal to site automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) in the village. As you, the residents of Kniveton would be the beneficiaries of having the assurance of access to defibrillators in an emergency, councillors would be keen to hear from as many as possible with thoughts and ideas in progressing this project. Why not come to the next Parish Council Meeting where defibrillators will once again be on the agenda.

**Parish Council Website** – is up and running on www.kniveton.net Whilst it has displayed upon it all the required information, the Parish Council would nonetheless appreciate help from any local resident who has an interest/skill in website management/design.

**Vacancy** – With the resignation of Cllr David Lang who is moving away from the area, there is a vacancy on the Parish Council. The Parish Council is required to post a notice indicating the vacancy. An election will be held if ten electors give notice in writing requesting such an election to the

**Returning Officer, Derbyshire Dales District Council, Town Hall, Matlock, Derbyshire DE4 3NN.** The closing date for such requests is Friday 9th October 2015. If no requests for an election are received, the Parish Council will fill the vacancy by co-option. *David has asked me to record his sincere thanks for all the help, support and friendship he has received from residents during his time in the village and as a parish councillor. Likewise, councillors are grateful to David for his work on the Parish Council over many years where he has served both as a councillor and Chairman.* 

Highways – Several issues were raised with input from DCC Cllr Irene Ratcliffe. 1) The grit bin located at the junction of Main Road and Longrose Lane is to be repositioned outside the school for safer access during winter weather. 2) Clerk to contact Highways Department requesting that the damaged grit bin on Hillocks needs to be replaced by the same rather than a pile of grit. 3) Clerk to contact DDDC re cutting back banked verges on Longrose Lane.

**Footpaths** - Blocked footpaths at Kingshead Lane and Newhouse Lane; DCC Rights of Way has been informed. Reported some cutting back around gates needed on footpath Jitty/Wood Lane/James Lane. Councillors would be pleased to receive any reports of footpath maintenance issues and whilst funds for this work are limited the Parish Council will endeavour to keep local paths in good order.

**Correspondence** – Letter of complaint received from visiting campers on a local campsite re noise emanating from wedding function at Standlow Farm. Complaints passed on to Environmental Health.

**Finance** – Payments and balances to 8th September 2015 were presented and approved by the meeting.
