**Operation Christmas Child – Shoe Boxes**

It is the time of year when we are beginning this year's shoebox campaign. The new leaflets are available, and we have planned an open coffee morning in the Cornerstone, Ashbourne on **Wednesday, 13<sup>th</sup> October from 10 am to 12 noon**. You will be able to buy covered shoeboxes, hats, scarves, gloves, plus stationery items at reasonable prices. In addition, there will also be preserves, cakes and books for sale. Proceeds will go towards transport costs, which of course have risen sharply over the years. In spite of the requested donation towards transport being increased to £2.50 per box we were dismayed to learn that last year the shortfall of income over donations was the equivalent of a staggering 167,000 boxes without the requested contribution. Samaritan's Purse made up the difference, but as this is not the main purpose of the charity, which provides clean water, sanitation, food and shelter, particularly in disaster areas. If this happens again they will cease to organise this project which gives so much joy to thousands of children. We are very grateful in Ashbourne for donations towards transport, but ask you to bear in mind the importance of gift-aiding your contributions. Remember, too, that you can donate on line. An acknowledgement slip will be provided, which you place in the box in lieu of a cheque or cash. We don't know yet where the boxes will go this year. As soon as I have word I will let you know. 'Shoe Box Sunday' will be on 28<sup>th</sup> November, which will be our usual Family Service at 11 am. Please ring me if you want more information. 


