KNIVETON PARISH COUNCIL

It was discussed and agreed that the signs to be erected on the main road at the entrance to the village will now be made of hard wood. The work will be carried out by craftsmen from the village.

It was felt that the play area would benefit from additional seat. A Donation was received to enable further seats to added to the seats already provided courtesy of "Friends of Kniveton School.

During discussions it was felt that there were instances of inconsiderate , possible dangerous, parking of cars at the bottom of the village and on the main road through the village. This matter was brought to the attention of PCSO Cleveley who was in attendance. PCSO Cleveley stated that she would bring the matter to attention of the appropriate authority.

Recurring pot holes at the Hillocks and other parts of the main road continue to be reported , although these generally got repaired fairly promptly, the passing of lorries quickly undid the repairs. Councillor Purdy stated that he will pursue a more permanent repair .

Proposed alterations to the Chapel

The Methodist Chapel members are exploring the possibility of installing a WC and small kitchen within the premises. An additional plan is to level the chapel floor, remove the pews, and provide chairs. We feel that this would make a building which would double as a community facility as well as a worshipping area. As the building is listed we are restricted in the type of alterations we can make as we listed building consent. KNIVETON VILLAGE HALL

The Kniveton Village Hall Committee held one on its regular meetings on the 28th September in the village Hall. The general condition and financial position were discussed at length and it was agreed that all was in good order. The interim accounts were presented and they revealed a small trading loss. However this was anticipated as essential building and electrical repairs and modification have been carried out. Items of furniture have also been repaired where necessary to ensure that these items are safe for users of the village Hall, especially the children of the school who rent the Village hall during the day in term time.

It was the view of the committee members that the hiring of the village Hall by families and organisations has declined. It was felt that a timely reminder to all the villagers and clubs etc that this village amenity was officially opened just twenty years ago on the 6th September 1991. There are excellent facilities and it was built to provide a place where villagers and clubs could meet and socialise and stimulate a friendly and social atmosphere.. It is available for all parties young or old for all occasions, birthdays, weddings club and show meetings etc. Kitchen facilities and Catering facilities are available. 

Kniveton School International Links

As part of the school's international work, Class Two have been doing some research into the types of jobs which are done by their parents, and how far they have to travel to work.

This information will be taken to the Gambia, by Mrs Board and Mrs Cartlidge, when they visit our partner school – 'Janet International' in the Gambia at October half term. They will then carry out the same research with the children there, in order to compare lifestyles and to consider sustainability.

Our research found that our parents' jobs included IT manager, bank worker, nurse, surgeon, artist, engineer, scaffolder, hotel director, solar power business, recycling/waste business, insurance worker, teacher, teaching assistant, work connected with the railway, housewife, Rolls Royce, medical writer, estate manager etc. In terms of travelling, we found that 5 people worked from home, 4 worked in Ashbourne, 6 in Derby, 10 travelled further, with the furthest being to Cape Verde and Gibralter! We now await the results from our partner school eagerly so that we can compare and contrast and consider why there may be differences.



John and Nancy Bradbury's Golden Wedding Anniversary

Congratulations to John and Nancy Bradbury who celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary on September 23rd 2011.

John and Nancy both came from farming families with John living at Ban House Farm, Newhaven and Nancy, the youngest daughter of the late Frank and Mary Stafford, who farmed at Standlow Farm, Kniveton.

They were married at Kniveton Church in 1961 and started their married life at Winn Farm, Kniveton which was battered by a severe gale in the winter causing extensive roof damage and the following winter was one of the coldest on record. Certainly not one of the easiest starts to married life!

They started with a few Jersey cows which they successfully built up over the years to a herd of over 100 cows, which is now farmed by their eldest son John and his family.

During years of hard work building up a family farm John and Nancy still found time to contribute to the local community by hosting Young Farmers Club Activities and public open days. They have always been actively involved in the village with John involved in the start of the Kniveton Sports Club in the late 1960's, playing cricket, football and dominoes for many years and was also a Referee in the summer league football.

John did committee work for the NFU and was involved with the school as a Governor for many years. He still has responsible roles with the Parish Council and the Church. It was this commitment over the years which earned him a well deserved MBE in 2005.

Nancy has also been involved in village activities over the years. Being a founder member of the Kniveton Slimmer's Club. She is an active member of the WI and the Church.

Both John and Nancy work tirelessly for the Village Hall, being on the Village Hall Committee and keeping it in pristine condition. They have organised popular fundraising Whist Drives for many years and organise the annual Harvest Supper.

The couple shared their Anniversary Celebration with over 80 family and friends at the village hall. Several generations took a nostalgic journey over the past 50 years, browsing over photo albums circulating the room and enjoyed a wonderful buffet meal. It was a great afternoon enjoyed by all and passed all too quickly.

It was a fitting occasion for John and Nancy who have had a happy and hard working relationship over the past 50 years and long mat it continue. (With a bit less hard work perhaps!) At the Sunday morning Family Service Nancy and John received another surprise gift from the Church Congregation of a large pot and Ornamental shrub.
